## Island Delegate At Reunion Of Scottish Churches

The following interesting letter from Rev. J. W. S. Lowry, Minister in charge of the Church of Scotland, Cambridge, Mass., is reprinted from the Cambridge Tribune. It gives an interesting account of the great reunion of the Churches of Scotland at Edinburgh last October, at which assembly Rev. Mr. Lowry was present as a delegate from the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island.

"While youngsters and others are celebrating Halloween in real old Irish style, I am remaining quietly indoors with my friends here and writing to the Tribune these impressions of the old homeland.

"I may remark that the great reunion of the churches in Scotland at which it was my privilege and delight to be present, was as magnificent a scene, as I have ever witnessed. The Church of Scotland General Assembly met in the Tolbooth church in Edinburgh, on October 1, the Duke and Duchess of York being present, representing King George and Queen Mary, who were prevented from being present, owing to illness of the sovereign. I sat with this assembly as a delegate from the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, and was very cordially welcomed. After some routine and other business matters, the assembly adjourned to the following day, to reassemble for the union with the United Free Church, which was simultaneously sitting in their hall close by. On Wednesday morning, October 2, the two church courts met again, and after appropriate and impressive devotional exercises, the two assemblies left their respective places of meeting and meeting at the corner of a neighboring street, the two moderators shook hands warmly, as did the ministers and elders as they mingled together and walked four abreast into the St. Giles' Cathedral (John Knox's old church), where a very solemn service of praise and prayer was conducted by the moderators and others. I should state that while the huge procession was proceeding along the street to the church, crowds of interested spectators burst forth into the joyful singing of the 124th and 133rd Psalms, and the long metre Doxology, 'Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow.' After the thanksgiving service in the cathedral church, the assembly convened in the Assembly Street hall, an immense building, neatly fitted up for the great occasion, and seated for the accommodation of 12,000 persons, every seat being occupied. Devotional exercises, consisting of the joyful singing of Psalms, led by a precentor, without any instrumental accompaniment, and earnest prayers being conducted, the act of union was read, and all the members and delegates giving their assent to it by standing and lifting up their right hands, the union was declared to be consummated, and the two great historic churches of Scotland were united into one national church—the Church of Scotland. The Duke and Duchess of York were again present occupying a seat, behind the moderator, the duke being lord high commissioner to the assembly and presenting an address from the king, to which the moderator of the united church, Rev. Dr. John White, made a fitting reply.

"A social reception was given in the evening to all the delegates and their ladies by the Lord Provost of Edinburgh, in the city council chamber, which was a very pleasant affair, and was numerously attended. "A communion service was held in St. Giles' Church on the morning of Thursday, October 3, the spacious edifice being filled to overflowing, and in the evening greetings were brought to the united church by representatives of almost all the Presbyterian bodies throughout the world, as well as of other denominations. After praise and prayer, and the apostolic benediction, the great world-wide through dispersed.

## NEWSY FARM NOTES

### BIRDS, THE FARMER'S FRIENDS

Before passing on to a consideration of those groups of birds which are of benefit to the agriculturist (and others which are not) it may not be out of place to point out some of the ways whereby we can guard our feathered allies from the many dangers which beset them. We cannot, as I have said, increase their numbers artificially, as is done with some enemies of our insect foes, but we can protect them in the young stage, when they are susceptible to sun, wind and rain, the two latter especially. Violent rainstorms are sadly destructive of the nestlings, and properly constructed nesting boxes are almost a necessity. Our School Fairs are doing good work in offering prizes for the best constructed boxes, and might with good effect increase the number of prizes so as to stimulate a more general interest among the young.

Boxes should be hung out sometimes before the birds come, so that they may get a "weathered" look before house-hunting time, for birds in general are suspicious if the box looks too new. It does not do to hang the box too high up as this invites the common sparrow, which by the way, is very troublesome to the high-building swallows: from ten to fifteen feet is about the right height. It is unnecessary to have perches on the boxes, indeed they are a help to that inquisitive bird, the sparrow. The roof should be perfectly tight, and should overhang sufficiently to prevent the sun from shining directly on the nestlings. The entrance hole should not be on the floor-level; perhaps six inches above the floor would suit the generality of birds. Make the entrance hole just large enough for the bird you want: this will help to keep out squirrels, cats, and sparrows (in some cases) and at any rate gives the bird a chance to defend her nest if attacked by other birds.

The dimensions of boxes for some of our commoner birds are as follows: Chickadee, depth 8 to 10 inches, floor (inside) 4x4 inches. Diameter of entrance hole, one and a quarter inches. Box 6 to 10 feet above ground. Tree Swallow, depth 6 inches, floor 5x5 inches, hole 1 1/2 inches. White-breasted Nuthatch, depth 12 inches, floor 6x6 inches, hole 1 1/2 inches. Red-breasted Nuthatch, as the last but hole one and one-eighth inch. Screech Owl, depth 15 inches, floor

11x11 inches, hole 3 inches wide, 4 inches high. Robin, shallow, wooden trays six inches square, drainage hole in bottom; bracketed to post, etc., with protection of eaves, arbor, or other screen overhead.

After the nesting season is over, the box should be taken down, cleaned out, and stored till the next season. The making of nest boxes is a pleasant and instructive winter employment for the children.

### ARTIFICIAL ICE

There has lately come to the front a product which promises to revolutionize many operations connected with the food supply. This is artificial ice or, as it is sometimes called, "dry ice," which is really solidified carbon dioxide gas. It is extremely cold, having a temperature of 114 degrees F. below zero, and possesses the remarkable property of changing directly from the solid form to a non-poisonous gas, without melting into a liquid. A comparison with ordinary ice shows artificial ice to be considerably heavier. A ten-inch cube of water weighs 36.1 lbs., and ordinary ice is 1-10 lighter, such a cube weighing 32.5 lbs. A similar cube of artificial ice weighs 40 lbs. Owing probably to its greater density, its rate of "melting" is only one-third of that of common ice, and consequently it yields more refrigeration, pound for pound. The present cost of manufacture is about 10 cents per pound, but it is quite possible that, as the ice comes into more general use, the price will be reduced. The cakes may be compressed into any size for sale, may be cut with a saw, or broken with a hammer. As it never melts into liquid form it can be shipped by parcel post along with the article it protects. A trial shipment of ice cream from New York to Cuba, was protected by "dry" ice at 60 per cent of the cost of shipping in salt and common ice. This economy in use, together with its other advantages, will make artificial ice more heard of in the near future.

### ANTHRAX

In Newsy Notes of Oct. 23rd I gave a short account of the disease known as Anthrax or Splenic Fever, and some notice of the unique experiments of Prof. Schilling of Arkansas, who rendered animals immune by introducing porcelain capsules of the Bacillus anthracis into their peritoneal cavities. I stated further that I had never heard of a case of this dreaded disease in Prince Edward Island. By the courtesy of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, whose bulletin No. 120, New Series, I have just received, I am enabled to add that cases have been reported from all provinces except P. E. Island, and Manitoba, and between the years 1907 and 1920 Quebec and Ontario reported 74 cases each. For the last 10 years the scourge has abated, and this year Ontario had two cases and Quebec none. Anthrax figures largely in literature from the fifteenth century to our own day. In 1770, 15,000 persons died of anthrax in six weeks in San Domingo; it was supposed they had consumed the carcasses of animals which had died of the disease. The bulletin closes with a copy of the Dominion Regulations to Anthrax, which is very stringently dealt with.

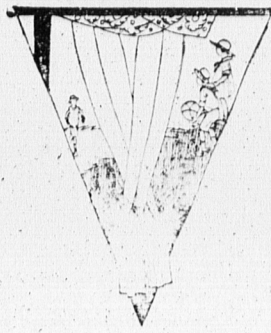
