BRANCH OF WAR VETERAN'S ASSN. FORMED

Former Meeting Ratified. Club Room Secured Which Will be Furnished by I.O.D.E. and Provided Free by the City.

The adjourned organization meeting of the local branch of the Great War Veterans of Canada was held in the city court room last night at 8 o'clock.

The President Capt. A. R. B. Duck was in the chair and there were also present Major Stanley, Capt. Martin, Lieut. Palmer and about twenty of the returned boys, some of whom had not seen service in France.

Among the visitors were the Rev. Major Fullerton, Major A. A. Bartlett, His Worship Mayor Brown, Mr. H. Chandler and representatives of the Patriot and Guardian.

The meeting was mostly of an organizing nature and it was some time before it got down to actual business.

Capt. Duck, in the course of his opening remarks stated that the boys should not be too hasty in forming committees and passing resolutions as he knew personally there would soon be hundreds of Island boys returning home from the Hospitals in France and England veterans of the fighting at Vimy and Mons—all good men who should have as much voice in the governing of the association as those present. He stated that Major F. B. McRae of the Canadian Machine Gun School is making it a duty—a pleasant duty—to keep trace of all Island born soldiers who pass through England. No matter where they came from America, Canada, South Africa, New Zealand—if he was born on the Island here the Major would find out sooner or later and he was making a complete list of all the Island boys now on service. Major Stanley said that he understood the Government is also preparing a complete list of all soldiers who had enlisted from this province, which list would be invaluable for securing the proper membership of the association.

ROOM SECURED FREE OF ALL CHARGES. Mr. E. F. Acorn, a member of the Executive committee, stated that through the generosity of Mayor Brown, an excellent room—equipped with running water, sewerage, electric lights and steam heat, on the second floor of the market building had been given to the association for their own use as a club room. Major Fullerton promised on behalf of the Daughters of the Empire that that body would be only too pleased to furnish the room well and comfortably, absolutely free of all charges. Mayor Brown told the men briefly that he would do all that was reasonable for them and knew that the citizens also would assist them in every way.

Major Bartlett said that he was with every movement, heart and soul that would help and cheer the returned soldier. Though too old and not well enough to go to the front with the boys from home his heart was with them and he was proud to know and honor the lad who had "done his bit". "All that I can do for you," declared the Major, "will be cheerfully and willingly done and I promise the hearty co-operation of my wife and the women folks as well."

Mr. Reuben MacDonald, on behalf of the newspapers, offered the men the freedom of the press to further the movement, and assured, the veterans of any legitimate assistance they might desire.

Dr. Fullerton gave the men some sage advice and hearty counsel, speaking from his past experience in connection with the South African Veteran's Association.

He prefaced his remarks with a tribute to Major Bartlett, who had repeatedly tried to go overseas with the boys, but could not pass the Medical Board; and to Mayor Brown who had always opened the doors of his hotel to the returned soldier, making him his guest during his stay in the City. He advised the men to prepare to be thrown on their own resources, to unite their forces for the common good, particularly of the weaker fellow soldier who may have fallen under the sway of temptation. He told them that if they wished to be an influence, they should have the sympathy of the people and this could be secured only through good conduct and ordinary hustle.

He advised them to have a discipline committee, equally strong with the disciplinary rules of the organizations they have served under; well defined clubroom rules; entertainment committee, and an employment committee to see that the returned soldier had a proper chance to secure positions in private and public offices.

He touched on the habits—bad or otherwise of some soldiers—and stated that the companions of such—the fellow soldier—had a big opportunity of doing good work in helping along such weaker ones. "Help these men," declared the Major "and be saviours of your comrades, as you have been saviours of your country."

In closing he stated that he was ready to back up all his promises with actual performances.

Mr. Chandler also spoke along the same lines, giving the men some excellent advice on the needs and qualifications now demanded by employers.

The following officers were elected: Honorary President—Mayor P. S. Brown.

President—Capt. A. R. B. Duck. Vice-President—Capt. Martin. Secretary-Treasurer—Sergt. Norman Lowther.

After some private business the meeting adjourned, for two weeks.

NEW SHELL ORDERS MAY BE GIVEN TO "SCOTIA" NEW GLASGOW, Oct. 18.—It was reported today that the 45 presses at the Steel Works are to start up again in the near future and that a substantial order for shells of that size has been received. An inquiry at the Steel Works office this morning elicited but little information, no one being willing to say much on the subject in the absence of the president who, in company with a number of the directors, is on a tour of inspection of the Wabana ore property. It seems to be the impression that there may be renewed activity in shell making, the result of the inability of American manufactures to take care of the American and British orders for shells at the same time. Whether new business will come from the Imperial munitions board, or be sublet by the American manufacturers, is not yet known, but it is probable that the business will come through the Imperial munitions board.
