## Ace Hudkins Wins Spectacular Bout With Phil McGraw

NEW YORK, Nov. 1—Ace Hudkins, the Nebraska Wild Cat, carried off the judges' decision over Phil McGraw, of Detroit, tonight, in a spectacular twelve round slugfest featuring the boxing show at Madison Square Garden before a crowd of 18,000. It was a return match with Hudkins repeating his victory.

McGraw conceded seven pounds in weight, 132 1/2 to 139 1/2, but outpointed the blonde corn husker as they battled through the first three rounds at a fast clip. Hudkins absorbed punishment at close range. A left hander cut his eye in the third but McGraw called and rocked his rival with solid smashes to the jaw.

Hudkins fibred McGraw for a count of seven with a left hook in the fourth round. Phil fought back but was groggy under a succession of headling smashes to the head. Hudkins forced the fighting in the fifth and staggered McGraw with a left to the body. McGraw rallied in

the sixth and mixed on even terms. McGraw outfought Hudkins in the seventh, ripping over a succession of uppercuts that split the Nebraska's mouth and had his head bobbing like a cork. Blood spattered from McGraw's nose after one exchange. Phil kept the aggressive in the eighth. He had Ace swinging wildly. Hudkins opened the ninth with a rush but missed most of his blows. They battled head to head with McGraw leading more effectively.

Hudkins felled McGraw in the tenth with both hands a steady attack and was booed for what the crowd believed were questionable tactics in the clinches. The Wild Cat came out of his corner before the bell for eleventh and forced McGraw about the ring. They were head to head most of the time, Phil chopping and the Ace swinging.

### Boxing Officials Make New Rulings For Future Bouts

HALIFAX, Nov. 1—Iron-clad rules and regulations, designed to make fight promoters toe the line in the strictest sense of the word have been evolved by the Halifax Boxing Commission, which for some months past has been ruling with a more or less lenient hand, the fight game in this City. In future the Commission has decided, boxing promoters must comply with the constitution of the Boxing Commission if they would have their requests considered and so that some may plead ignorance of the more important parts of the Commission's institution, the following sections have been given to the press, principally for the benefit of promoters:

1. One week's notice, accompanied by fees covering proposed bout, must be given Commission.
2. Contracts, on forms approved by Commission, must be filed with the secretary of the Commission by noon of the day prior to the bout.
3. List of preliminary fighters must be handed to secretary of Commission not later than noon of the day two days prior to the bout.
4. No advertising shall be done by any promoter until the Commission has first approved of the bout.

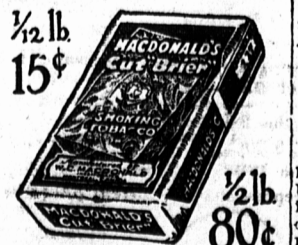

## French Olympic Hopes Are Dealt A Heavy Blow

PARIS November 1st—France's chances of making a good showing at the Olympic games at Amsterdam in 1928 were dealt a heavy blow today by a series of military decrees virtually eliminating athletics from the French army.

The decrees were issued as a result of the decision to reduce compulsory service in the French army by one year, the army heads apparently taking the stand that the time for training was not so short that young Frenchmen needed every available hour to become good soldiers.

The decrees, which French sport writers consider fatal to the nation's Olympic chances, provides for the cancellation of all permits and furloughs for soldiers to participate in sporting and athletic competition after May 15, 1927. The famous Jolivielle Military Training School from which the best French athletes have been drawn since the armistice also will be eliminated. Army corps championships will be done away with and there will be a general decrease in physical instruction.

Caston Vidal, former Under-Secretary of State for Physical Education and Sports, told Minister of War Painleve today that the decrees spelled the doom of athletics in France. The army, he said, has always been the best recruiting office for the athletic federations, the only French winner at the 1920 Olympics at Antwerp being Josef Guillemot, who has then under colors. Guillemot won the 5,000 metre run, defeating Paavo Nurmi.

## Petri and Lands Head Bike Racers

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—A four lap lead separated the German-American team of Petri and Lands from the second placers today as the fifteen entries in the international six-day bicycle race pounded into the last two days of the grind.

At midnight, the 99th hour, Petri and Lands were in definite possession of the four lap advantage after travelling 1,666 miles.

## South Shore Boys Will Gather For a Big Conference

SHELBURNE, Nov. 1—Twenty boys of Lunenburg, Shelburne and Queens counties are discussing with interest the forthcoming conference for Older Boys which will be held at Shelburne, Nov. 19th to 21st, when the representatives of the various groups will gather for consideration of common problems and for instruction and inspiration.

Donald McPhail, Associate Secretary of the Halifax Y. M. C. A., will be in charge of the conference, which gives promise of being a successful gathering. Last year there was an attendance of 80 delegates at the conference for this section of the Province, held at Lunenburg.

Mr. McPhail, who is one of the most popular boys' men in Nova Scotia will be assisted by Rev. M. Bledsoe, the Baptist pastor and Rev. L. E. G. Davies, minister in charge of the United Church at Shelburne.

HALIFAX, Oct. 30.—Acadia College Rugby Football Team and the United Services played a 3-3 tie in an exhibition game on the Wanderers' Grounds yesterday afternoon.

The final score just about indicates the relative strengths of the competing teams. Acadia's score resulted after a run by the three quarter line which was almost fumbled at the critical moment, while the Services notched up their three points on a plunge following a scrummage on Acadia's five yard line. The game was clean and open with play at centre field the majority of the time. A number of injuries were the only marblemaking instances of the game. Both scrums were heeling well and the two forward lines each got the oval to their halves about fifty per cent of the time. However, both sides lost many chances to make long gains by fumbling.
