DR. PARKIN SAILS FOR AMERICA ABOUT RHODES SCHOLARSHIPS

Will Visit Canada, the States and Australia—Hopes the Maritime Provinces May Share

ALTHOUGH NOT MENTIONED IN RHODES' WILL

English Newspaper Men Arrive in Quebec to Make a tour of Canada Represent London and Scotch Journals—First Steamer for South Africa will Sail in October.

DR. PARKIN SAILS FOR NEW YORK. LONDON, Aug. 15.—(Special).—Dr. George Robert Parkin, Principal of Upper Canada College, Toronto, who was appointed by the trustees of the will of Cecil Rhodes to prepare a plan for the allotment of the Rhodes scholarships, left Liverpool to-day for New York.

INTEREST IN DOHERTY MURDER. St. John, Aug. 15.—(Special).—At the Police Court this morning a vast crowd assembled to hear the preliminary examination of Frank Higgins and Fred Goodspeed charged with the murder of Wm. Doherty. AN EXPECTANT CROWD DISAPPOINTED. They were doomed to disappointment. THE MAGISTRATE SPEAKS. After disposing of two cases the Magistrate surveyed the crowd for a few moments and then announced there would be no preliminary examination to-day nor to-morrow either. PRISONERS AGAIN REMANDED. This was enough for most of the crowd and there was a sudden exit. However the boys were brought in later and remanded until Tuesday next.

OTTAWA WANTS THEM NEXT YEAR. OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—(Special).—John Coates, President of the Ottawa Board of Trade sent instructions to E. B. Eddy, attending the Manufacturers' Association at Halifax, a strong invitation to meet in Ottawa next year. NOT PAID FOR A YEAR. Mr. Profontaine M. P., who has just returned from the Yukon, says that the telegraph men who are threatening to strike have not been paid, some of them for a year and are borrowing money at two per cent a month to meet their living expenses. OTHER GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES NOT PAID. The Montreal Gazette publishes this statement and insinuates that this state of affairs applies generally to the Yukon service.

HAIL-STORM PASSED OVER ALBERTON

Yesterday Afternoon, Causing Considerable Damage.

STONES OVER INCH LONG.

Windows Broken—A Farmer Loses His Entire Crop—Hail a Foot or More Deep.

ALBERTON, August 15.—(Special).—A terrific hail and rain-storm swept over Alberton South, this afternoon. The hail measured from one to one and three quarter inches in length, and heaped in places a foot deep. G. R. Montgomery lost about all his crop which is a heavy one, and many windows are broken throughout the neighborhood. The extent of the storm was about a half mile square.
