THE regular meeting of the Charlottetown Military Institute took place last night, and was well attended. A very interesting discussion took place on two important military subjects. ABUNDANT success attended the efforts of St. James' church congregation in making the tea and sale given in the hall yesterday evening one of the best financially and otherwise, held for a long time. The attendance was large and an enjoyable and sociable hour was spent. The sales from the ladies' table amounted to about \$110; tea table, \$97; refreshment table, \$43.60; willing workers, \$30; candy table, \$30; ice cream table, \$27, making a grand total of \$357.60.

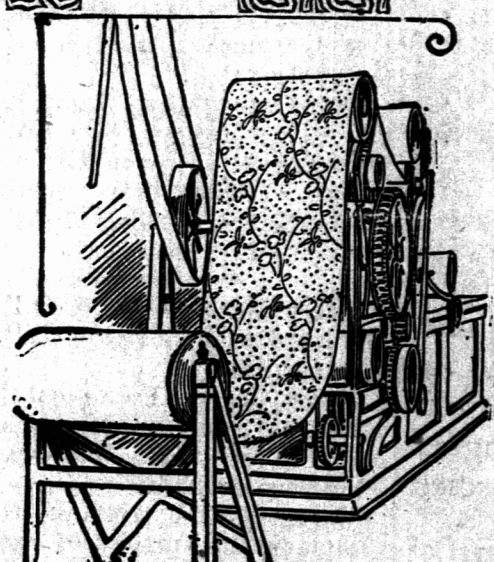
