Motor City Team Clip Hawk Wings In Third Game

Send Stanley Cup Series Into Fourth Game By Third Period Rally.

CHICAGO, April 8.—The King of the netmen, Charlie Gardiner, made a soft shot from outside the net tonight for a goal into the net tonight for a goal. Detroit Red Wings hurtling their way back into the Stanley Cup playoffs picture with a 5-2 victory over Chicago Black Hawks.

The easy-looking shot from the net of Doug Young, Red Wings defenseman, broke a 2-2 tie in the third period. It was a crowd of 17,000 gaping at the great Gardiner as he pulled the puck from his hands and it kept the classic series going.

The Wings drove in two more goals in the dying minutes of the game to make their first play-off triumph over the Hawks secure. They had lost the first two games and defeat tonight would have brought the Stanley Cup to Chicago for the first time. The game will be played here tonight and if the Wings win the deciding fixture will be held in Detroit.

Turns Tide

Six New World's Swimming Records At Ohio Meet

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) COLUMBUS, O., April 8.—The greatest record-breaking spree in the history of the United States Amateur Athletic Union was the result of officials described the Union's indoor swimming championships which came to a close last night in Ohio State University.

Six world's records lay in the bottom of the pool today as the New York Athletic Club back-boned by three members of the Spence family, which formerly lived in Montreal, swept eastward with the title for the third consecutive year. The easterners scored 37 points to the University of Michigan's 24.

Drysdale, University of Michigan, 3:38.4. 220-yard breast stroke, Leonard Spence, 2:43.5.

Moncton Hawks Caught Offguard By Detroit Six

(By Elmer Dulmage, Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, April 8.—Some of the much publicized polish had been scraped off the titled Moncton Hawks tonight and an astounded Canadian hockey world viewed a machine that was defending the Dominion's traditional amateur hockey supremacy in a series with an under-rated challenger from United States.

A game, fighting White Star team from Detroit, slower and less potent in every department than the Hawks, scored a 2-1 overtime victory here Saturday night over the Allan Cup holders in the first of a three-game series for the North American championship.

Stars Outplayed
About 2,000 spectators watched the scene with some amusement for two periods as the Hawks easily outskated the American champions, did everything they liked with the puck except shoot it past 240-pound Pete McMahon, the agile giant in the Detroit goal. The apparently dallying Hawks left the ice after the second period with the score tied at 1-1.

The amusement quickly turned to consternation in the third session when the Allan Cuppers attempted to produce some sort of wallop that would flatten the invaders—and found none. The White Stars got through that period without being scored on and in the 10-minute overtime stanza they scored a neat winning goal.

In the famous "bull-pen" of Maple Leaf Gardens, the betting boys were laying odds of 10 to 1, even as late as the start of the third period, that Moncton would win the game. There was little Detroit money available.

Second Game Tonight
Second game of the series will be played here Monday night and if Moncton wins the deciding game will be played Wednesday night. There was every prospect that the better will keep the odds on Moncton fairly high for the second game because most critics believed the Hawks, now thoroughly frightened, would even the series handsly.

A couple of former Toronto St. Michael's College juniors, Gordon Hunt and Jimmy Sullivan, administered the lethal blow to the disorganized Canadian champions after three minutes and 16 seconds of overtime. Aubrey Bigham, White Star centre who hails from St. Thomas, Ont., started the play.

Bigham sifted into the Moncton territory and laid a pass on Sullivan's stick outside the Hawk defence. The left winger sidestepped big Bill Gill and forward passed to Hunt, parked on the edge of the Moncton goal crease. Hunt was uncovered and he fired a high shot into the net.

Neglect Backchecking
Even though there was little punch to their attacks, no accuracy in shooting and a tendency to utterly neglect backchecking, the Hawks maintained a wide edge in the matter of territorial play. They outskated the Detroit forwards without effort. It was the White Star defence and Goale McMahon that caused the trouble.

The bulky McMahon, surprisingly active, blocked at least a dozen shots from just outside his goal crease. Drives for the net corners were no more difficult for him than low smashes at his feet. He cleared fast and his work provided by far the outstanding individual highlight of the game.
