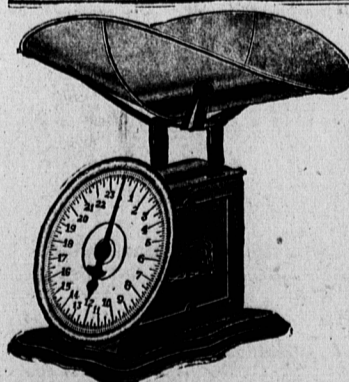

At the Layman's Missionary Conference now in session at Halifax the response to the words of welcome was eloquently made by Lieut.-Governor Rogers of P. E. I. He also put the audience in good humor by some witty Scottish wit. He wondered why men whose lives were so largely given to politics should be taking such a prominent part in the missionary gathering. He said politicians were accustomed to go to their meetings without any preparation and when they heard what the other fellow said "to pitch into him." That would hardly work here said His Honor. Amid enthusiastic applause he said that he was not only a politician but that he was also all along trying to be a Christian. He touched a tender and tense cord by recalling a scene from his boyhood when Dr. Geddie was being sent forth to the South Sea Islands from his home church on the Island. Governor Rogers spoke impressively of three idols which are too much worshipped in our lands. These idols are: 1st, Bacchus, 2nd, Mammon, 3rd, Mars, the God of strong drink and money and war. "Let us," he said, "put ourselves right as those who in our everyday life and relations with other nations practice the principles of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Wednesday before the full Court, composed of the Chief Justice and Justices Fitzgerald and Heward an important question involving a fight to arrest a non resident who contracts debts while temporarily residing in this province came up in the case of James A. Sheehan and ano, against G. Stephen Whitehead. The defendant was arrested under a Bailable Writ issued upon an affidavit that the defendant was a non resident within the meaning of the Act abolishing imprisonment for debt and under the exceptions in that Statute was liable to arrest as a debtor. The application was made by the defendant to set aside the Bailable Writ on the following grounds: 1—That the defendant was a resident of this province. 2—That the plaintiffs were partners and could not commence proceedings against defendant without first registering their partnership. The facts were that the defendant was the contractor for the Elmira Branch Railway and came to this province in the spring of 1910 for the purpose of carrying on the work and remained while the work of actual construction was going on, but returned to his home in Fredericton, N. B., during the winter months and whilst the work was closed down. Affidavits were produced showing that defendant had registered at the hotels in Charlottetown as belonging to Fredericton, N. B., and that he was about closing the work at Elmira and leaving the province. It was contended by the plaintiffs that they were not such a partnership as required registration under our local Statute as they entered into a joint contract with defendants for a certain specific job in contract only and was not a general partnership. The Court refused to set aside the Bailable Writ. J. J. Johnston, K. C., for plaintiffs McLeod and Bentley for defendants.

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
