(Continued from page 1.) by an artist who has not only produced beautifully harmonizing tones and values in all the effects, but has thoroughly understood the possibilities of the materials employed. The result has been that the interior is without question the most beautiful commercial interior in our country. It is a triumphant proof that an architect's work in solving a purely business problem may be of high artistic excellence.

Gray, foggy tones—"gris-deperle"—have been used almost exclusively. The offered classical ceiling is supported by columns of purplish-gray Formosa marble, with composite capitals. The wood-work is of a close-grained, hard, Philippine teak, treated with a soft silver-finish, and inlaid with borders of polished steel and brass. The floor is also of teak, in fifteen-inch widths, and bordered with brass stripes and marble slabs. The artificial lighting is from silver-chandeliers. The walls are divided into panels of polished Terrazzo of a speckled texture. The elevators are the finest piece of artistic steel work in this country, and place our metal workers on a level with the great smiths and forgers of the German Renaissance. Directly back of the main elevators is a special Exhibit Room, trimmed in ash and with a coffered ceiling inlaid with brass. The main staircase, eight feet broad, is of Formosa marble similar

NO DIVIDEND ON THE CUNARD LINE

LONDON, April 13—The Cunard steamship company, like the German shipping lines, has suffered heavily from the depression in the shipping trade, and will be unable to pay a dividend. The company's report which has just been issued, shows a profit of \$1,745,180, which, however, is not sufficient to meet the depreciation in ships and properties, necessitating the company's drawing on the reserve fund for expenses.

The portion of the second floor facing Fifth Avenue, devoted to the exhibition of bronzes, is subdivided by columns of the Pompeian Ionic character.

The President's Room and the Board Room are both executed in mahogany. The remainder of the second floor is devoted to the Counting Rooms, Correspondence and Advertising Departments.

The larger part of the third floor is given over to the Pottery and Glass Department. On this floor are also the Registry Offices and Order Mail scholarships from the internat-

On the fourth floor are the Mail Order, Library, Heraldic, Designing, Engraving and Photographing Departments; also the Watch Shop. The fifth floor has the Goldsmith's Shops and the Diamond-cutting and Polishing Departments.

The sixth floor contains the Clock, Case Goods and Leather Work Shops, Storerooms, etc.

The seventh or top floor did not exist on the original plans. The architect, finding how much available room remained, decided to vault up under the outer iron framing, and so constructed a magnificent hall of fifteen thousand square feet, which recalls the old city halls of the Hanse cities. In the centre of the room is an elliptical skylight, twenty feet broad and sixty feet long.

The Safe Deposit Vaults and storerooms for valuables are in the sub-basement. Massive silvered iron bars surround this department, the walls of which are lined with Pavonazza marble.

The main vault two stories below the Fifth Avenue sidewalk is encased on all sides by gun metal and seems the embodiment of a bomb-proof shelter. The walls of the Coupon Rooms are of white opaque glass.

Under, and directly back of the Thirty-seventh Street sidewalk, lies the Shipping Room. Here all packages from the various departments are loaded into the delivery wagons, which are then raised by an independent elevator to the protected vestibule inside the building, from which they can run to the sidewalk.

VIEWED UNION WITH DISFAVOR

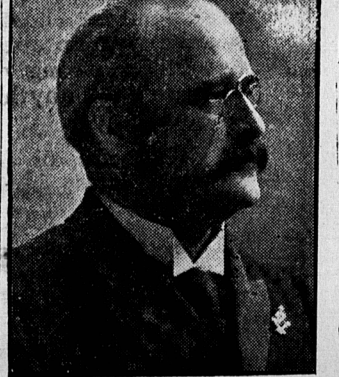
TORONTO, April 14—The much-mooted question of a Dominion Baptist Union was thoroughly discussed at a largely attended meeting held in the city Saturday, at which delegates were present from almost every governing board in Ontario, in addition to a number of representatives from other Provinces. In the Baptist Church, as at present constituted, each church body is complete in itself, having, in fact, a separate entity. It has long been felt that an organization answering to the general conference of the Methodist Church or the assembly of the Presbyterian Church would be in the best interests of the Baptist Church, and the name suggested for the organization has been announced at the Dominion Baptist Union, Strange as it may seem, the seventy delegates assembled Saturday did not view the plan with favor, and, after a somewhat heated debate, the meeting adjourned until next October, when another attempt to bring about the desired union of the various boards will be made.

MAMMOTH SHIP YARD FOR LAKES

CLEVELAND, O., April 13—The largest shipbuilding yards on the Great Lakes, costing more than one million dollars, covering over thirty-five acres of land, and giving employment to at least three thousand men when completed, will soon be built at Ashtabula, Ohio. Final contracts for the construction work were signed here Saturday by A. C. Pessano, president of the Great Lakes Engineering Works, General D. C. Moon, of the Lake Shore Road, and R. P. Reid, president of the Ashtabula Chamber of Commerce, representing the City of Ashtabula. Work on the new plant will be started soon.

WOMAN TO PRESIDE AT GATHERING OF CHEMISTS

PARIS, April 13—Mme Curie has just been chosen to preside over the international chemistry congress, which is to be held in London. This is the first time that a woman has been distinguished in this manner. Another woman has also just attained a distinction which had never before been won by a female competitor. This is Mile. Heuvelmans, who was awarded the Prix Lemaire, one of the highest awards given at the Ecole des Beaux Arts. Mile. Heuvelmans had already competed for the Prix de Rome and come out high on the list. Her success over her masculine fellow students in the Lemaire competition seems to show that she was to try again, the Villa Medicis may yet see a girl student.

In fact, since the successes of Mile. Rondenay in painting, Mile. Heuvelmans in sculpture and Mile. Nadia Boulanger in music, this seems so ossible that Carolus Duran has had studies prepared in Rome, in case the threatening invasion becomes a fact.

ARRESTED ON A MURDER CHARGE

ERIE, Pa., April 13—Delmar J. Young was arrested today on a warrant sworn out by County Detective Frank H. Watson, charging him with the murder of his mother, Mrs. Virginia M. Young, whose dead body was found in her cellar last Wednesday, horribly mutilated and hidden beneath a pile of old carpets. He entered a plea of not guilty and was committed to jail without bail for a hearing next Thursday.

THE FUNERAL OF MME. MODJESKA

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 13—Almost buried from sight in a profusion of flowers, the casket containing the body of Mme. Modjeska has occupied a guarded place of honor in the Knights of Columbus club house since Saturday. This morning at 9:30 o'clock at St. Vivian's cathedral the funeral services began under the auspices of the Knights of Columbus. High mass was celebrated by Monsignor Harnett and the funeral sermon was preached by Bishop Conaty. After the church ceremony the remains were taken to Calvary cemetery, where they will be kept in a vault until Count Bozenta's affairs are so arranged that he can take the body to Holland.

MAYOR OF TORONTO OFF FOR ENGLAND

TORONTO, April 13—Mayor Oliver and City Treasurer R. T. Coady left this evening for England via New York, in connection with the floating of \$6,000,000 of city bonds, necessitated by the construction of a trunk sewer and other large works on hand. Controller J. J. Ward will occupy the mayor's chair in the meantime, and will act as president of the council. In seventy-five years of the city's existence, Mr. Ward is the first Catholic to occupy this position.

DEATH AT SPRINGFIELD

The death took place at the residence of her brother Ronald McDonald, Springfield, on April fourth of Miss Isabella McDonald, at the age of 76 years. The deceased lady enjoyed good health until three months previous to her death, when a disease of the throat set in, which proved incurable. She bore her painful illness patiently, feeling quite resigned to the will of Providence. The patience and resignation was, throughout her long life, a leading trait of her character. Her humility, her magnanimity and her great charity towards all, were always a source of edification to her many friends. The funeral cortege to St. James' church, Free-town, where a Requiem Mass was sung by her pastor, Very Rev. Mr. D. J. Gillis, gave evidence of the high esteem in which she was held by the people. The pall bearers were her nephews, Joseph Linnis, Austin, Augustine, John and Alfred McDonald. Three sisters, Mrs. Lamb, Minneapolis; Mrs. Gillis, Sydney; and Mrs. Cash, Merrill, Wis., also two brothers John Merrill, Wis., and Ronald, Springfield survive her.

SERIOUS RIOTS HAVE OCCURED

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 14—The garrison here made a violent demonstration yesterday afternoon before Parliament against the Committee of Union and progress and the Government.

They demanded the dismissal of the Grand Vizier, the Minister of War and the President of the Chamber. The outbreak was caused by an order to the troops that they must obey their officers under all circumstances, even if called upon to shoot down co-religionists.

The mutineers seized all the officers of the Committee of Union and Progress and held them prisoners. Only a few of the troops refrained from taking part in the demonstration.

They have orders to fire on anyone approaching the building, and scores of persons were killed or wounded. Deputies were escorted to the Chamber in order that they might vote on the question of forming a new Cabinet and appointing a new president. Deputy Emir Arslan was killed on his way to the House in mistake for Mustafa Jahid.

The reports of the killed places the number as high as 17 and the wounded at 30. There is a report that the Minister of Justice, Refik Pasha, has been murdered, that the Minister of Marine was wounded and the Minister of War taken prisoner by the mutineers.

AUTO SPEED FIENDS WILL BE WATCHED

MONTREAL, April 13—Chief Campeau, of the city police force, stated today that while he was not planning any spectacular "Drive" like that recently made in New York on automobile speed fiends, he was taking quick measures to see a good many offenders made to contribute to the police court exchequer. While in New York, motor car drivers can be fined on the bare word of a policeman that they were going too fast, in Montreal the laws are more strict, and the complaints has to specify the exact speed at which the machines are driven, a hard thing for policeman unaccustomed to holding the watch on races to do. Chief Campeau has adopted the expedient of marking off a course on a favorite automobile street, and keeps a couple of plain clothes men at each end. Each man is armed with a stop watch and they time each machine as it goes by, without making any move to give the game away and it is expected that a good many chauffeurs will be caught napping before the regulation fine of \$20 and costs makes them observe the law. Last year thirty convictions were secured, resulting in fines aggregating \$600. There are many more autos in the city this year, and stricter efforts will be made to make them keep within the speed limit.
