LONDON, Feb. 16.—(CP)—A German submarine was reported bombed and possibly sunk in the North Sea today. An official British statement said that "an enemy submarine was bombed and possibly destroyed in the North Sea today by an aircraft of the Royal Air Force coastal command."

Will Seek Adjustment Of Feed Prices

MONTON, N. B. Feb. 16.—(CP)—A brief seeking an adjustment in the prices of mill feeds to farmers of the Maritime Provinces is to be prepared and presented to the Dominion Government as soon as possible by the Department of Agriculture of the three provinces. This decision was reached tonight at a meeting attended by Agriculture Ministers A. C. McDonald, of Nova Scotia and W. H. Dennis, of Prince Edward Island, as well as their deputy ministers and other officials.

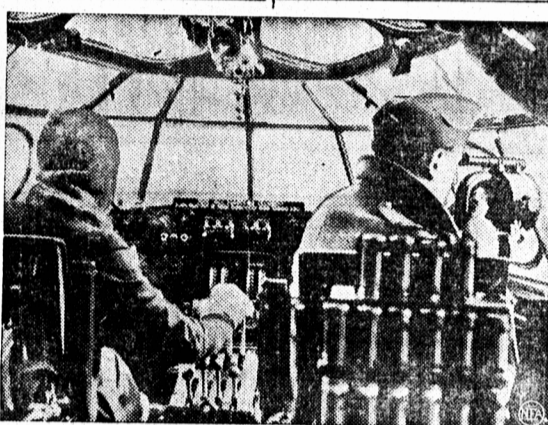
