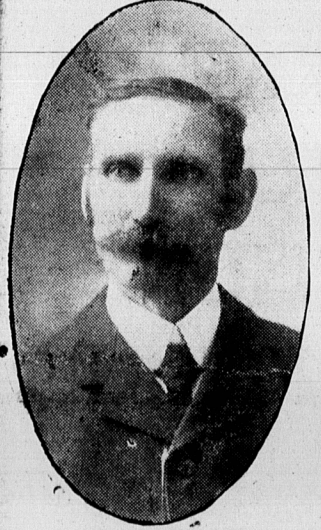

NEW CANADIAN BANK COMMERCE

All tenders for the construction of the new Canadian Bank of Commerce in this City are in, and it is expected that the contract will shortly be let. The new building will be a valuable acquisition to Charlottetown, and will be one of the most handsome of the kind in the Lower Provinces. It will have a frontage of 69 feet on Grafton Street and 31 feet on Queen Street. From the ground up to a height of 4 1/2 feet it will be built of Ohio buff stone. The rest of the material will be of pressed brick with terra cotta pilasters and columns and heavy cornices. The architecture is of Gothic design with ornate features. It will be a three-story building. The ground floor will be occupied as a bank, with the main entrance at the corner of Queen and Grafton Streets, and the managers' office overlooking Queen Street. At the west end of the building a stairway will lead to the first floor, in which a suite of commodious offices will be installed. On the second floor will be a large assembly room and ante-room. The ground floor will be finished in white quartered oak, and the upper floors in red oak. The public space in the bank will have a marble floor of the most modern design; the other floors will be finished in maple. The screens for the accountant, teller, etc., will run east and west, and the furniture will be in keeping with the requirements of an up-to-date banking institution. The building will be lighted by large windows, the lower ones being of heavy polished plate glass. The system of ventilation will be the best, and the lavatories of modern design. The electric wires will all run in conduits, there being iron pipes for every wire, thus tending to greatly lessen any danger from fire. There will be a metre in each office upstairs, with a cut-off to be used in case of a storm. There will be four large vaults in the building, with their walls lined with steel. One will be in the basement for the books, another will be on the ground floor for the use of the bank, and the remaining two will be on the first floor for the use of the sub-tenants. The ceilings of each room will be finished in plaster, with heavy cornices. The hardware throughout will be of special manufacture, and of elaborate design. The plans were prepared by Messrs Darling and Pearson, the well known contractors, of Toronto, and the building will cost between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

PLAYS FRANKS IN HARBORS OF LAKE ERIE. BUFFALO, N. Y., May 8. - Lake Erie has been exhibiting a weird behavior since midnight, and has risen and fallen several times in a manner that old mariners along the water front say has never before happened in their memory. Between two and three o'clock this morning the lookouts at the life-saving station noticed that the water was rising rapidly. At four o'clock it had risen from four to five feet, according to their estimates, a condition that has never been known to exist unless a gale was blowing. Between four and 5:30 o'clock this morning the water began going out of the harbor with a rush. It went down so rapidly that the boats in the Blackwell Canal and along the river tugged at their moorings and were banged hard against their docks. The steamer Iron Queen, lying at the Old Salt Docks on the Blackwell, pulled up the piles to which she was moored and was carried down with the rush of water to the outer harbor, where she was caught by the police boat before she had sustained any serious damage.

What caused the rise of the water in the harbor no one seems to know. Marine men are at a loss to account for the phenomenon, but refer to it as a tidal wave.

Mr. Cuthbertson, the forecaster, reported that the wind was blowing only 36 miles an hour at five o'clock this morning, and in a direction opposite to what would have caused the rise in water. He was unable to account for the phenomenon.

YACHTS A HOBBY OF THAMES THIEF

LONDON, May 8.—It seems rather surprising that the London papers this morning had so little about the remarkable criminal career of Frederick Murray, or Sylvester, who was sentenced yesterday at Old Bailey, only brief summaries of the trial being printed.

The story of his career is certainly sensational enough. He seems to have had a particular belief in the value of yachts—that is, other people's yachts—as the headquarters for crime.

Thus at the age of fifteen he had set up in a small yacht at Greenwich as a pirate, living on what he procured by theft from river barges. In 1900 he was sentenced to two years' penal servitude at Chelmsford.

His release he stole a well appointed yacht and committed burglaries in various parts of London, using the yacht to hide the stolen property.

He was eventually caught, and after a successful sentence he returned to the river with still another stolen yacht. He went about armed and when next caught was sentenced to five years' penal servitude, with three years police supervision.

While serving this he made the acquaintance of a convict named Stevens, who was serving ten years. On his release he and Stevens set up in another yacht on the river, and after a long run were caught again at Grays. Murray escaped from the Grays police station, but was caught and then escaped from Dartmoor while serving his sentence, but was again serving in November, 1908.

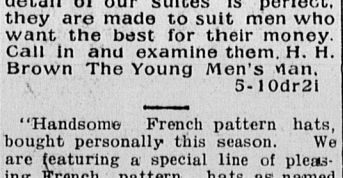
He went straight back to the Thames, and, buying a yacht, the Silver Spray, had thoughts of using it as a coiner's den. He got the plaster of Paris and metal on board, but eventually abandoned the idea and threw the plaster and the metal overboard.

When the police found the yacht, and were waiting on board her for him to turn up, he abandoned it and stole another, the Elsie. Then he stole the Eve as his next enterprise. The latter was a good sized, quick sailing yacht, and he loaded it with stolen property and raced down the river, intending to get to the Continent, but had a collision with another boat and just managed to swim a mile.

It may well be questioned if any criminal ever before showed such a sense of secrecy of the river world.
