The late Miss Irving, after spending some time in the study of nursing in the P. E. I. Hospital entered the Lady Stanley Hospital, Ottawa where she has been for several years. A few days ago she was taken ill with typhoid fever and shortly after her brother George who had been summoned from Buffalo, arrived at her bedside she passed away. The Executive of Provincial Sunday School Convention met in Grace Methodist Church at 2 p. m. yesterday to discuss ways and means to further the work of the Convention. The District Convention met at 3 p. m. and discussed plans and filled up vacancies in committees, etc. The public meeting for the evening was in part postponed owing to the weather. The new Field Secretary, Rev. Mr. Archibald, gave a very interesting Black Board exercise of interest and much help on "A Method of Teaching." The following is a brief outline of the lesson as presented by him. The work of the teacher is to stimulate the mind of the scholar, to stimulate the mind to guide them to the truth, and to inspire the scholars to live the truth. If this is to be accomplished the teacher must have some method of teaching, which may be followed more or less closely. The following are the steps of a good teaching method. 1 Prepare the scholar's mind for the new truth that is to be taught. 2 Present the lesson material. This will give the scholars one concrete phase of the general truth. The amount of material presented in each lesson must be adapted to the mental capacity of the scholar. 3 Transition from the concrete case to the general truth. Other illustrations of the same truth must be presented and compared with the truth of lesson, and the scholar must be led to see general truth and to state it in words. This general truth should be summed up in the Golden Text, which should not be asked for until this part of the lesson. The scholar now has general truth, a principle which should be of practical value to him in his life, but to make sure that he can use this truth the teacher must use another step: 4. Application. Problems must be presented closely connected with the life of the scholar and he must show how the problem is solved by the truth he has learned. A general discussion of the method presented followed which added to interest of the meeting. Another public meeting in the interest of the work for the District of Charlottetown will be held soon.
