GRAIN LETTER.

CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—Wheat—Opened steady 1/2 lower on disappointing cables and prospects of larger World's shipments but ranged higher on good general buying through commission houses and local crowd. Argentine shipments for the year about 22,000 less than a year ago. Trade moderate in volume.

Corn—Has been very active and shows further advances. General buying by Commission Houses, considerable of which thought to be for foreign account on the unfavorable conditions in Argentine.

Oats—Have been very dull ranging a little firmer with wheat and corn. The shipping demand is poor.

Provisions—Higher on general buying but scattered Commission Houses also some foreign buying of January. Packers and stockers at stock yards traders moderate selling on the bulge.

CLOSING STOCK LETTER.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—The market showed strength at the opening this morning and its strength was maintained during the latter part of the day. Shorts seem to be somewhat nervous, and there was more of a disposition on the part of the professionals to cover up than to tight the advance as they have on previous days. There was not much effort made to bid up stocks and prices advanced easily in the early dealings. The rise in call money to 7 per cent caused no selling as it was generally believed that a rise would be very easy within a few days after the resumption of business succeeding the holidays and it was also realized that stocks bought today would not have to be paid for until next year.

In the last hour some moderate profit taking by the traders coming in a very narrow market caused prices to slide off quite easily again so that net changes on the days business were trifling. Such as they were however were generally in the shape of advances. As call money went up exchange declined and it is now at a figure which again causes talk of the possibility of Fed. imports.

CLOSING COTTON LETTER.

(From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—For some time past the cotton market has been more or less nervous over the possibility of the January notices. The steady ruling of January yesterday had been somewhat reassuring but when the local traders came down this morning and found that tenders would probably approximate 200,000 bales there was a renewal of apprehension. It was evidently feared that there would be a lot of scattering liquidation and possibly a sharp break. On the contrary competition developed for the cotton. The two large spot interests who have taken up cotton on December and were supposed to have issued the notices they being the only ones in a position to have issued such heavy notices had broken around the ring apparently to buy in their hedges. Their action certainly suggested willingness to take back every bale that they issued. But a number of outside houses were said to be stopping notices and late in the day it was estimated that the big spot people lost nearly 100,000 bales of the cotton. One of the houses connected with last season's bull campaign and which has recently engaged ocean freight room for 10,000 bales for January shipment from here is rumored to have stopped notices for 60,000 bales. We know of a number of small lots taken up by people who have acted later months against their January at a sufficient premium to pre-carrying charges and a moderate rate of interest, and the January developments have merely tended to accentuate the fact that so far this season spot cotton has been a burden upon any market. It would be reasonably to suppose that circulation of this vast number of notices had left January pretty well liquidated at any rate there will be no immediate fear of tenders. Meanwhile the movement is falling off and today's exports were more than double the port receipts.
