The deceased was an outstanding citizen of Summerside for fifty years. He was born in Grahams Road but moved to Summerside when quite a young man. He carried on a meat market in the old Market Hall, when Summerside had a daily market. Later he took a farm east of the town and supplied milk to residents of Summerside. After a while he again entered the meat business and continued in that until he bought the farm on Linkletter Road, which he farmed successfully up to a few days before his death. He was a prominent trader in livestock buying for the various markets abroad. Mr. McLeod was very highly respected and well known for his integrity in his dealings with his fellow citizens. He was a prominent Liberal, and Mason, and was Past Master of the Hiram and Lebaron Lodge, No. 3 of Summerside. He was also a member of the Presbyterian Church until the Union when he became a member of Trinity United Church, Summerside. He is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Catherine Morrison of Graham's Road, two sons, John W. of Saskatoon and James of New Jersey, who visited his father, remaining on the Island about six weeks; also one daughter, Mrs. Robert Champion of Darnley, to all of whom the sympathy of the community is extended. The funeral took place under Masonic orders on Saturday afternoon.—S.
