### STARTED FLYING FROM BARN ROOF

MIAMI, Fla., March 18—Crystal Mowry, holder of four world air records for women, entered flying by way of the barnroof on her father's Colorado farm.

Leaping off the low barn roofs with home-made wings didn't satisfy either Miss Mowry or her parents. She saw a plane for the first time in 1914, and had her first ride with Pilot Eddie Stinson in 1921.

From then on the problem was how to finance flying lessons. Her family wasn't inclined to back such aerial ambitions. They moved to Miami and she found the solution—parachute jumping.

When Crystal asked fliers here in 1929 to let her "bale out" before Sunday crowds to pay for her flying lessons, they laughed, but she went on. That was the first of about 30 jumps—jumps that sometimes sprained her ankle when she landed but which paid for her learning to fly a plane.

She borrowed two planes of different types, and proceeded to stack up four Miami records in classes where none existed previously for women.

The records include a speed of 79.2 miles an hour for 100 kilometres in a three-place open seaplane (Kittyhawk), a speed of 66 miles an hour for 100 kilometres in a multi-seated plane weighing less than 771.61 pounds (Aeronca) and two altitude marks.

### Business Showing Big Improvement

MONCTON, N. B. Mar. 17—Business conditions in eastern Canada are showing a much greater improvement this year than for any year since 1929, according to traffic figures quoted by W. U. Appleton, Vice-President and General Manager of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways, at a conference of agents on the region held here. With the exception of 1929, density of freight traffic for the month of January this year on the region surpassed in volume that of any corresponding month since the amalgamation of the various system lines in 1923. While this year's net ton mileage per mile of road was 18.5 per cent less than the 1929 figure, it reached nearly 120 per cent over 1933, and in comparison with 1936, a gain of

### Increase In Lumber Exports

Export of timber and timber products from Canada to South Africa increased approximately 110 per cent last year over 1935. Prospects for 1937 are particularly promising. South Africa's trade last year established a new all-time high. Exports amounted to approximately \$370,061,600, an increase of 11.5 per cent over 1935, an increase of 14.5 per cent. Preliminary figures for imports from Canada last year show an estimated value of approximately \$15,000,000, which constitutes a new record, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways.

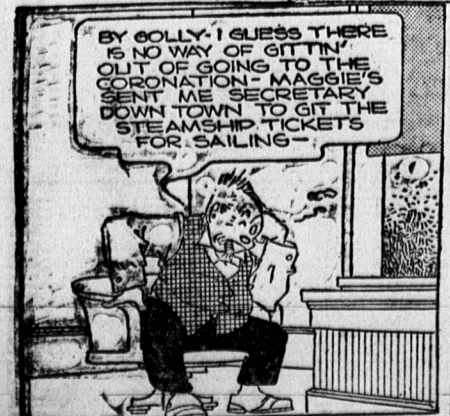
