

AT PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

The following article in a New Hampshire Newspaper from the pen of Lewis W. Brewster, of New Hampshire, who returns today from a visit to this Province is worthy of publication, if only for the tribute it pays to the Garden Province.

Charlottetown, P. E. Island, Sept. 2, 1911.

Once more at Prince Edward Island!—and now your correspondent is reviewing scenes, places and people with whom the three previous visits to the "Garden of the Gulf" have acquainted him. It is more beautiful than ever the more one travels over and around it. Not long after leaving the old favorite steamer Halifax (which, by the way is to be replaced by a new boat next year) we find ourselves raving about among the most attractive spots of Charlottetown—scenes and places which have already in three previous epistles been pictured as well as the ordinary pen could be expected to do it, and they are as delighted as ever, especially so as the companion of our trip had never seen them and was quite as enthusiastic as could be desired.

Venturing beyond the scope of former visits we took a carriage ride one day across the island some fifteen miles to the "North Shore" where the Gulf of St. Lawrence washes the beaches and attracts many visitors from Charlottetown and other places from the side of the island that borders the straits of Northumberland, as well as visitors who, like ourselves, are seeking the sources of pleasure and satisfaction which give a charm to Prince Edward Island. There they opened to us with a new "thrill," as Miss Montgomery expresses it in her character of Anne Shirley in her delightful book, "Anne of Green Gables."

The re-reading of this delightfully picturesque story of Prince Edward Island adds a new coloring to all that has been said and written about this pretty and highly favored northern beauty spot. Her picturing is strongly colored, but after this trip to the North Shore one must fully endorse every word of it. We saw it not in the glory of springtime and early summer, but we saw enough of the remains of beauty to satisfy us that she was correct—just as we say of womanhood which has the graces and attractiveness of maturity bearing the impress still of what charmed her associates of early life. The red soil of the entire island is very fertile and productive, and what is better, it has been almost everywhere well cultivated. The contrast of the red soil and the rich green of the foliage and the outspreading woods, fields and farms, even though the latter often show now the wheat and oats in their yellow socks and the ground in the stubble—all these are spread over the slightly undulating country with a delightful harmony and make us feel that we are looking at a very broad-spread picture wherein the nature artist has carefully (or, rather, tastefully) blended the colors

to please the eye of the observer. This new view of the island scenery is delightfully charming, and makes us desire to extend our acquaintance with the scenery that surrounds us. Miss Montgomery, (now Mrs. McDonald) has glorified the island and the books she has written about it tell better than can a new visitor how beautiful the island is.

Just now in common with the whole Dominion of Canada, Prince Edward Island is in the throes of political excitement. The present prime minister, Premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, is a candidate for re-election, and together with Hon. W. S. Fielding, the candidate for Chancellor, and Hon. Charles Marcell, the speaker of the House of Commons is canvassing the Dominion. The great question is "Reciprocity." These men are "Liberals," who are ardently favoring it. The opposition comes from the "Conservatives." On Friday evening, Sept. 1, these three came in three-quarters of an hour after the time appointed, and that vast audience began to be impatient, but quite well-behaved. It is nearly twenty-one years since he had visited the island, and he was received with great enthusiasm. His theme, "Reciprocity," which was handled with much ability and earnestness and received tumultuous applause from the audience. The "Liberals" are in full power now, and appearances indicate that they will carry the Dominion by a large majority.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is an able and very noted man who has long been known to the public and has served in many responsible positions, both in Canada and England and in Washington. He is a fine speaker and made an excellent address of an hour or more in length, which was listened to with the closest attention by the large audience.

As Sir Wilfrid rose to respond to an address of welcome by F. H. Seljar, president of the Charlottetown Young Liberal Association, Miss Beth Rattenbury, a pretty young miss of that city, stepped up and presented a beautiful bouquet, which the Premier acknowledged with a less than graceful thanks, amidst the applause of the audience. He also at the close of several addresses made a brief address in their own language to the French people who were in attendance. Another large bouquet was presented to Mr. Fielding, as he rose to deliver a brief address. Mr. Fielding is Canada's greatest financier, and what he had to say—went! But the best orator of the evening was speaker Marcell, whose voice without apparent effort reached the entire building with convincing effect. The large audience held their seats and standing places until 11 o'clock.

Last Wednesday there was one of the greatest of funeral pageants at Charlottetown. Judge John A. McDonald, stipendiary magistrate of the city, died suddenly on Sunday. He was affiliated with most of the prominent orders and associations of the city and with the military, having served with distinction in the South African campaign, and was Major of the Light Horse brigade of this place. It was a military funeral, half or three-quarters of a mile in procession led by a brigade of soldiers in British uniform. His coffin was borne upon a gun carriage and was followed by his riders—less horse and his comrades of the Light Horse Brigade. The rest of the procession represented the various societies and interests in which he had been an active participant followed by a long line of private citizens. It was altogether a body of representative men of Charlottetown, who made a fine appearance.

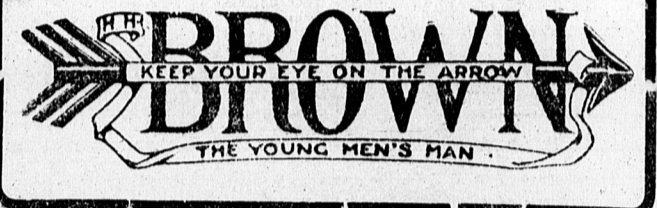

BOWLER TO FIGHT SUIT OF \$50,000

DEDDHAM, Sept. 18.—George Pendleton Bowler, the ex-Harvard man, whose forgeries of 1905 resulted in his spending a year in Concord reformitory and his comrades in Cambridge jail, in an answer to a suit for \$50,000, filed against him here by Mrs. M. Colby Little of City Mills, says that the notes which he gave to Mrs. Edith Stevens Reynolds were not for "value received," and that therefore they are not collectable.

LEFT WIFE AND CHILD

Bowler's name has been a byword throughout the eastern part of the United States for the past six years, since he left his wife and child in their Hemingway street, Boston, home and went to New York, with 23-year-old Edith Stevens Reynolds, the wife of his friend, George Reynolds, also an ex-Harvard man.

Columns have been written of the young man's escapades while spending the greater part of \$300,000 which it was claimed Mrs. Reynolds took to New York with her when she accompanied him there; of his arrest on a warrant sworn out by "Poco" Bennett, the Boston broker, on a charge of forging the name of his brother, Robert P. Bowler, to the notes and the subsequent attempt of Mrs. Reynolds to secure the \$50,000 bail for him while he was awaiting trial in the Charles street jail.

The young woman, regardless of the fact that his wife's presence in Boston was well known, openly declared her love for him, and said that she would move heaven and earth to se-

WOMAN HOLDS NOTES

The answer which Bowler has just filed is in connection with a suit for \$50,000 entered two weeks ago by Mrs. M. Colby Little of City Mills, Mass. She says that she is the holder of promissory notes dated New York, May 16, 1906, and Nov. 16, 1906, drawn by George Pendleton Bowler, made payable to Edith Stevens Reynolds in the amount of \$15,000 and \$10,000 respectively, in any New York bank for "value received," indorsed on the back, "M. C. Little, Edith S. Reynolds, Edith Stevens Reynolds."

She says that the notes were delivered to her before maturity for "value received." She says that they have been submitted to the defendant Bowler for payment, but that he has refused to pay them.

She asks that she be awarded damages in the amount of the face value of the notes with interest from the date on which they were drawn.
