RETURNS FROM TORONTO.—Rev. Dr. Heartz returned Thursday from Toronto, where he was in attendance at the annual meeting of the Board of the Methodist Church. This was Dr. Heartz's forty-first year in succession in attendance at this Board, and constitutes a record so far as the Canadian Methodist Church is concerned. The feature of the meetings was the attendance of an influential Chinese layman who is devoting his wealth to the promotion of missionary work in China. His presence, according to Dr. Heartz, created renewed enthusiasm for the work and made the session one of the most interesting held for some time.—Amherst News.

FOUNDATION DAY.—At the suggestion of Mayor McKenna who paid an official visit to the institution last Thursday, the teachers and pupils of Notre Dame Academy will today observe the sixty-seventh anniversary of its foundation. THAT CAR OF YOURS BY HARRY E. PORTER

This is a series of articles pertaining to maintenance and repair of your Automobile. We will be glad to answer through this column, questions regarding your car or its mechanism of an automobile. Send your inquiries to "Automobiles" The Guardian.

At this time of the year the body of your car will undergo many changes, owing to extreme cold in the morning and night and comparatively warm in the afternoons.

There will be cold wet days, cold dry days, warm wet days and cold nights, all these conditions have an alarming effect upon the body construction of an automobile. Distortion will take place in many cases and body squeaks will develop.

The good condition of the car's body will be enhanced by taking necessary precautions now. Take a mixture of cylinder oil and gasoline of equal parts with a clean brush and paint every joint or friction surface on the metal parts of the body, fenders, aprons, etc.

The friction surfaces are where one part joins the other. Each joint should be lubricated with this oil. Do this two or three times in one week.

Some good black enamel underneath the fenders after they are washed will preserve them, and any bare spots on the wood work in the body of your car should be touched up so as to preserve it from the weather.

Joseph Sanders, who passed away at the home of his son Philip, Charlottetown, on Oct. 4, 1924, was a son of the late Philip Sanders and Sarah Agnes Campbell, and was born at Murray River, Prince Edward Island, in the year 1838. In early life he moved to Belle River and married Elizabeth Compton, daughter of that place. There they raised their family, and by honest industry and thrift built up a comfortable homestead. After the death of his wife, which occurred in 1914, Mr. Sanders made his home with his son Philip, visiting his other sons and daughter from time to time. Three sons, Henry

and Phillip, of Charlottetown, Royalty, Daniel of Rochester, N. Y., and one daughter, Mrs. Fred Boyce of Arlington, Mass., survive him, also one brother John Sanders, of British Columbia.

He was a man of great influence in the communities in which he lived, and many there are who have benefited by his counsel and advice. For many years he was Justice of the Peace for Queen's County, and in the performance of his duties upheld the law and won the esteem of the people.

It was in the sphere of religion that we cherish his memory. He was a devout and consistent member of the Church of Scotland, and held the office of ruling elder for over half a century. He was greatly missed in the active work of the church when he was laid aside in weakness of body, but even then those who came to his bedside were wisely counselled. He never weakened mentally, but grew in his knowledge of spiritual things. In the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, and in Him he has attained to the resurrection of the dead.

On Monday, October 6, at one o'clock in the afternoon, a service was held at the home of his son MacDougal, who was assisted by Rev. Donald Lamont. The remains were conveyed by train to Belle River. On Tuesday at one p.m., a large number of people gathered in and about the church at Belle River where the funeral service was held. Rev. MacDougal preached from Revelation 22:14. Blessed are they that do His commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the City.

The remains were interred in the family plot in Belle River cemetery, the burial being witnessed by many who mourned the loss of a son and devoted Christian citizen.
