Long Drawn Out Law Case Recalled

An echo of the five-year court battle waged by two Canadian churches for Jessie Gray's \$1,000 legacy was heard on Wednesday at the annual meeting of the Maritime Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. A summary of the long drawn out case was read to the delegates by Rev. Dr. Frank Baird of Pictou, N. S., who indicated it was still far from an end.

It had its beginning 13 years ago, when Jessie Gray, living at Hopewell, N. S., willed the \$1,000 to the Presbyterian Church in Canada. She died in 1922—after church union—without changing the will and puzzled executors turned it over to the courts for decision.

United Church solicitors contended the name "Presbyterian Church in Canada" did not belong legally to the continuing church, and held further that since Miss Gray had joined the United Church she intended the money to go to that church. But the Supreme Court ruled otherwise, deciding the money belonged to the Presbyterian Church. The Full Bench of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia affirmed this decision.

Leave was then sought by the United Church to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada. It was granted and the appeal heard in April of this year. Decision has not yet been handed down.

The synod heard details of another interesting case—that of Thomas E. Kelly of the Chebogue, N. S., who left \$20,000 to the Congregational church there on condition it did not change its adherence. The Supreme Court found it had become ineligible for the bequest by entering the United Church, and the money was ordered turned over to the Halifax School for the Blind.

Civic Welcome At Synod Meeting

Following is the address given by Councillor P. W. Turner in extending a welcome on behalf of the City to the members of the Maritime Presbyterian Synod at their meeting on Wednesday:

Mr. Moderators, fathers and brethren, in the regrettable absence of His Worship the Mayor, the duty and very great privilege of extending a welcome on behalf of the City of Charlottetown to the Maritime and Newfoundland Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Canada has fallen on me.

You are honored in having with you today the Moderator of the General Assembly and to him a very special welcome is extended, and we trust that his stay in this province will be more lengthy than his name would indicate.

We people of Charlottetown believe we are inhabitants of no mean city. In this city and within a stone's throw of where we are at this moment, in the year 1864 was born that lusty infant which has now grown to man's estate and is known as the Dominion of Canada. That historic room, in the Colonial Building is greeted a tablet on which are the words that should thrill the heart of every Prince Edward Islander.

It bears the following inscription: "In the hearts and minds of the delegates who assembled in this room Sept. 1st, 1864, was born the Dominion of Canada. Providence being their guide, they builded better than they knew."

With the passing of the years Charlottetown has ever taken her place in the progress and advancement of the age. In the great and all important elements that go to make up a well rounded Christian education, in the advancement of medical science, and greatest of all in the propagation of Christian religion, we stand high. In the Prince of Wales College we have an educational institution that is known far and wide, not only for its advanced design along modern lines, but for the calibre and ability of its graduates; in the Prince Edward Island Hospital we have an institution for the caring of the sick that is the last word along scientific lines, and in our churches we have edifices that would be a credit to any city or community. In addition to this and better still, we have a fine church going, law abiding, peace loving, and harmonious, living together in harmony and good will, and in their name and with this spirit I welcome you.

We read that the first Presbyterian church in modern times was founded in Geneva by John Calvin about the year 1541, and introduced into Scotland by John Knox about 1560. And just as Presbyterians have thrived in the United Kingdom, and the money was ordered turned over to the Halifax School for the Blind.

CLOSING SESSIONS

The invitation was gratefully accepted by the Synod. In reference to stocks and bonds, the Synod were interested to learn that they had maintained their value and in one case had increased their value. Rev. Dr. Baird explained that these stocks and bonds had been bequeathed to the Synod.

The Rev. Dr. George Ross, Fredericton, asked for information as to the procedure in cases where congregations might be able to call ministers, but not able to comply with the present requirements as to minimum stipend. After some discussion, a committee was appointed to consider the matter and report later.

Mr. G. S. Mitchell, Campbellton, N.S., presented the brief report of the Synod and the Young People's Societies. He reported a slight increase in the number of schools and a very slight decrease in the number of pupils enrolled. He reported 215 Sunday Schools in operation in the Maritime Synod and 10 in the Newfoundland Synod. He stated that on the whole the report is encouraging, and went on to mention that in the last three years the number of pupils enrolled has increased by 1,300.

The Rev. A. R. Roskamp, Hopewell, N.S., reported on the Young People's Conference held last July at Pictou. He mentioned particularly the fine spirit that prevailed at the Conference.

The Rev. Q. A. MacDowell, Sydney, spoke on the Daily Vacation Bible School at Sydney Mines. He reported that the Bible School this year was carried on with increased interest and enrollment. He stated that 355 were in attendance and mentioned the two courses of lectures which were provided, in connection with the school, for pupils of High School age.

The Presbytery Records report was presented by Mr. G. S. Mitchell. He reported that all records were approved with minor suggestions in two cases.

An overture to the General Assembly was presented by the Rev. Dr. George Ross making full provision applicable on completion of 25 years in the ministry, and the attainment of the age of 60. The former arrangement was 40 years in the ministry and the attainment of the age of 70. The overture was approved and ordered transmitted to the Clerk of the General Assembly.

The Rev. William Murchison, St. John, spoke on the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society. He stated that its resources are used to translate and spread the scriptures through the world. Its purpose is to see that every man has the Word of God in a language which he can read. He reported that last year 300,000 more volumes of the scriptures were distributed than the year previous. He mentioned that the Bible was translated into eleven new languages or dialects last year. Last year almost 11,000,000 copies of the Bible were distributed in 978 different languages and dialects.

The work of the Bible Society was heartily commended by the Synod to the interest and generosity of the congregation.

Mr. C. A. McVey, Fredericton, reported on the progress on the Newcastle Church fund.

In regard to the Pictou Boys' Residence, the Rev. Dr. Baird reported a satisfactory and happy adjustment of the obligations in connection with this institution. This report was received with appreciation by the Synod.

The Rev. William Verwolf, Durham, N. S., convener of the committee on Church Life and Work, presented the following recommendations:

- 1.—That the Synod hold an annual conference for ministers and Church Workers the first week in July at the Pictou Boys' Residence, Pictou. The Committee also recommends that Synod appoint Rev. D. O. MacKay as Director and Rev. W. Verwolf as Assistant Director.
- 2.—That Synod instruct each Presbytery at its next meeting to arrange an interchange of ministers for a week of evangelistic meetings and that conveners of Presbytery Committees report results to Synod's Committee next year.
- 3.—That the Synod demand a strict enforcement of the Lord's Day Alliance Act, this to be done in a manner discreet to the Synod, whether by a strong resolution to the Attorney General or by pressure of sessions upon local officials or both.
- 4.—That the Synod views with deep regret the tendencies of a naturalistic philosophy permeating text books of the Public Schools, and that "respect of religion" which the law demands is defeated by such a philosophy. That this resolution be sent to the Chief Superintendent of Education in each province in this Synod.
- 5.—That the Synod urge all ministers to study the matter of family worship and preach unceasingly its importance.

It was recommended that number four be sent back to the committee to secure and present data.

Rev. Dr. J. W. Smith, North Sydney, spoke in support of these recommendations. He stated that it is

Evening Session

An instructive and illuminating illustrated lecture on Palestine was given by Rev. Dr. Thompson at the evening meeting. Many fine views of outstandingly important places connected with Sacred History were shown. Dr. Thompson's explanations and remarks were of a very fine type and were much appreciated by his audience.

Rev. Dr. Luther Young spoke on the missionary work in Japan from which country he has only recently returned. He stated that it is only about 80 years ago that Protestant missionaries began their work in Korea. Now they have something over 400,000 converts. He stated that he believed that the secret of success of the missionaries in Korea is due to the diligent study of the Word of God. Dr. Young also spoke of his work among the Koreans in Japan, which has occupied his attention for the past seven years. He stated that this work is most encouraging. He also commended the work of the Bible Society, and stated that their workers are the pioneers in the mission fields.

At the close of Dr. Young's address Rev. Dr. Baird presented the report of the Historical Committee. This dealt with the proposed celebration in 1936 to commemorate the McGregor anniversary.

The matter of an assistant clerk was again referred to and a resolution was passed to the effect that at the next meeting of the Synod, names be presented from which may be selected an assistant clerk. In connection with the extension of the powers of Synod the action of the last Synod was reaffirmed.

Rev. Dr. Baird reported that the registration at Synod this year was the largest for several years. 50 ministers and 45 elders were enrolled.
