

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The legislatures of Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia are now all in session.

The net debt of the province of New Brunswick is stated by the Sun to be \$2,488,577. The annual interest on the debt in 1893 was \$127,000 and has been increased.

Now, we are told the Sultan of Turkey is about to formally protest to the powers against the British protectorate system in Egypt and the Sudan. This is no doubt in a line with Russia's appointment of consuls to the Sudan, and intended to bring about a conference of the powers with the object of check-mating Britain's progress in Africa. The situation is a very complicated one and the outlook is far from assuring.

Andrew Carnegie is strongly opposed to the expansion policy, and especially is he against the taking over of the Philippine Islands. He has publicly made the offer that he will pay out of his own pocket the \$20,000,000 promised to Spain, if the United States government will at once recognise the independence of the islands. There is no instance on record of a private citizen being willing to back up his opinion upon a great public question with such a vast sum of money.

In a recent speech at Brantford, Hon. Wm. Paterson, Minister of Customs, made the statement that while between 1888 and 1898 the foreign trade of the United States had increased 35 per cent the foreign trade of Canada had increased in the same time 51 per cent. The method of reckoning by per centage, is however, altogether in favor of the party conducting the smaller operations. It is much easier to make 50 per cent gain on a foreign trade of one hundred millions than on a foreign trade of a thousand millions.

General Gomez wants a very large sum from the United States before he will consent to disband his army. He claims to have 40,000 men for whom he wants pay for service since 1895 at the rate paid to United States soldiers. He claims to have twenty major generals under him, for whom he claims pay at the rate of \$7,500 each per annum, and about two hundred brigadier general for whom he claims \$5,000 per annum. Then too the colonels, lieutenant colonels and majors whose number amounts to thousands. In this way he makes up a claim of nearly \$60,000,000. Absurd and monstrous as such a demand appears, it is to be observed that if Gomez is not settled with he may in Cuba play the same game that Aguinaldo is playing in the Philippines. Uncle Sam has big business on hand just now settling with the rebels he was encouraging a year ago.

Keely of motor fame was once asked by a friend what epitaph would be appropriate for him when dead, and he replied: "The greatest fraud of the nineteenth century." He is since dead, and the fraud is fully exposed. Hollow wires, through which compressed air was forced at enormous pressure, a water motor concealed under the floor, an enormous magnet concealed where the experts could not find it till they tore his laboratory walls and machinery asunder, were among his fraudulent appliances. Altogether he played upon the credulity of the public till they were induced to invest millions in motor stock. The exposure is now full and complete. Keely well deserves the epitaph he coined for himself. The century has witnessed many gigantic frauds, but none of them eclipsed Keely.

As lotteries are forbidden by law in England many schemes are devised from time to time to work out the principle of a lottery and gather gain thereby without becoming liable to prosecution. London Truth calls attention to one of these. The editor of a weekly paper advertises that he puts every week ten £25 notes into a drawer enclosed in ten envelopes addressed to ten people in different parts of the country, whose names have been taken at random from directories and "other sources." If any one whose name is in one of the envelopes applies for it by letter, inclosing threepence in stamps, he will have it. A vast number of fools will send the stamps, and yet probably not one of the ten lucky ones will be among the number. It is a bold lottery scheme in effect, but it is doubtful whether it can be checked by legal process until new legislation is enacted.

There is much discussion from time to time in the newspapers of the large central provinces, of the proposal to make the Welland canal, or the entire canal system of Canada free from tolls. This scheme is warmly commended in Montreal and other cities which would benefit by the increased traffic. It is also earnestly sought after by the American freighters and forwarders who use our canals. As is well known we are bound by treaty to transport United States merchandise and products at the same rates as our own over the canal system. At present the canals, on which Canada has expended some seventy millions of dollars, do not pay their operating expenses, much less any of the interest on their cost, the latter being paid by the taxpayers of Canada in general. The proposal to give away the tolls is therefore a startling proposition. But very powerful influences are behind this scheme and the maritime press, and maritime public men will do well to be on their guard before the scheme has been accepted by the government. The game is well worth watching. We fail to see in what way the maritime provinces are to be recouped for the inevitable loss which free canals would entail upon them.


