ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

The County Court meets in Charlottetown today. There are 131 cases in the docket.

The work of cleaning the streets was commenced yesterday. A number of workmen were on Queen with brooms and before long the bigdiggers will be seen.

T. C. CASELEY, son of Henry Caseley, Kensington who has been on the Island since January visiting his old home and relations, left yesterday on return to Winnipeg where he is engaged in the C. P. R. steam shovel works.

The mail brought over by the Government boats at the Capes yesterday was the largest in the history of the ice boat service. The ice boat mail service closes today, and beginning to-morrow the mails will be taken by the Stanley via Georgetown.

There was crossing both ways at the Capes yesterday. The mails arrived at Cape Traverse about eleven o'clock. There was only one passenger, Arthur P. Thorne, the popular representative of Salada Tea. To torment the passengers were Mrs. Crosskill, Mrs. Arthur Newberry, M. H. Sprague and G. M. Young.

LOBSTERS are hardly obtainable for the reason that Boston people are willing to pay almost any money to get them. A Digby fisherman recently shipped a crate to Boston containing 110 lobsters and a check was received by him, after all expenses had been paid for \$54. The check was cashed here yesterday.—St. John Sun.

One week ago last Saturday, Daniel Gunn, a native of P. E. I. a foreman in the United States naval yard at Brooklyn, New York, was drowned. Two days later his wife died from the shock caused by his death. Seven children are left. The deceased lady was formerly Miss Savage, of Cape Tormentine, N. B. The circumstances are extremely sad.

The Guardian regrets to learn of the death of Mr. William S. Cook which occurred on the 22nd of March, at the residence of his son-in-law John Davison, Bedeque. He was in his 84th year. He leaves to mourn a sorrowing wife three sons and two daughters the sons are John Cook at Moncton, William and Richard Cook both of Mass. The daughters are Mrs. Ernest Gay of Mass. and Mrs. John Davison of Bedeque. Mr. Cook was a native of England.

The following are additional particulars regarding the death of Margaret Shepherd announced in the Guardian some days ago. The deceased formerly captained the Gospel Army which held meetings in Kindergarten Hall in this city. She married A. Shepherd of Charlottetown and shortly after went on the lecture platform in the United States. A Detroit despatch says: Although the death of the notorious Margaret L. Shepherd, the alleged ex-nun and anti-Catholic lecturer, has been kept secret for over a week, it was learned Saturday that this woman died in Detroit at Harper Hospital, on March 8, after an illness of four weeks. She was suffering with cancer, and died a few minutes after being taken from the operating table at the hospital. She had recently returned from Australia, after having spent three years on the lecture platform. She had no relatives in this city, but Mr. and Mrs. Leonard were her friends, and she came to make them a visit. Margaret Shepherd as she was best known throughout the world, was one of the most notorious women lecturers of the time. She had, perhaps, done more preaching against the principles of the Roman Catholic religion than any living woman. She claimed to have been a former nun, and she devoted her life to lecturing derogatory to her first religion. She was exposed several times, once by William T. Stead in London, and again by a Canadian priest. These did not, however, deter her from her purposes, and she continued in her violent harangues until within a short time of her death. She was taking a long rest preparatory to going on another lecture tour, having met with several reverses in Australia.
