STOCK-BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION.

The meeting of the Stock-Breeders' Association in our midst should be an event of more than ordinary interest to our stock men and farmers. It is of some moment that an association whose field is Eastern Canada should meet in the smallest Province of the group. It meets here for the first time largely because Island breeders and stock-men have not hitherto attended its meetings, and with a view to awaken a deeper interest here in the improvement of the live stock on our farms. That our farmers and stock-men have not hitherto taken much part in these meetings devoted to so important an object, has been in part due to our isolated position as a Province separated from the mainland. It has also been in part due to the fact that we have not fully realized the immensity of the interests at stake, and the greatly added wealth which improvement in our live stock must bring in its train.

There were in the Dominion at the time of the last census nearly 1,500,000 horses of all kinds, over 4,000,000 horned cattle, over 2,500,000 sheep and about 1,750,000 swine. Their added value represented probably \$190,000,000. A tabulated estimate of the live stock in Prince Edward Island in 1898 as given in the Statistical Year Book shows 30,000 horses, 14,000 cows and fillies, 55,017, milch cows, 55,014 other cattle, 176,800 sheep and 51,100 swine whose value would be between \$4,500,000 and \$5,000,000. In round figures let us assume that the live stock on the farms of Canada to-day represent a value of 200 millions and in our Island nearly five millions of dollars.

Now, let the thinking farmer recall for a moment the difference in value between the best horse, cow, sheep or pig, and the poorest one; let him reflect that in attendance, stable room, food, and all that goes to the proper care and maintenance of live stock the inferior animal exacts almost, if not quite as much as the superior one; then let him multiply the difference in value thus ascertained by the millions of the various species of domestic animals in the Dominion and he will see that this matter of improving our herds and flocks means millions of dollars in yearly profits and tens of millions in added value to our holding of live stock. There is a great deal of inferior stock on the farms of Canada. In fact there is comparatively little in the Maritime Provinces which is of the very best, if all the conditions are taken into consideration, for some costly mistakes have been made in introducing from abroad stock admirably adapted to other lands which are yet not best suited to the soil and climatic conditions of the Dominion.

We trust and believe that the meeting of the Stock Breeders' Association in Charlottetown may have an enlightening and stimulating effect, that may not be lost but bear fruit along the line of progress which it is the object of the Association to promote. The meeting has brought to us men who stand in the van of that progress, who by their intelligent and well-directed enterprise have made stock-breeding a success, and who from ripe and varied experience are well qualified to give us valuable information and suggestions. It has been a privilege to have them with us and to hear what they had to say. We trust that a greatly deepened interest in live stock improvement may result from the meeting.

A novel objection was taken at the election recount in Kings, New Brunswick a few days ago—that the ballots used in the election were not printed on paper supplied by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery as by law provided. The objection appears to be a purely technical one, and was overruled by the Judge, but on the ground that it was not taken at the proper place and time. The provision that the paper shall be officially supplied from Ottawa appears to have been designed to secure uniformity and also to prevent fraud. In some cases ballots have been removed from the boxes and other ballots fraudulently substituted. It is clear that when only a portion of the ballot papers were removed the difference in tint, texture and weight of the paper might furnish a means for detection of the fraud. If all were removed from a given box and others substituted the ballots found in that box would probably be all of one quality of paper, but if that were not the paper supplied officially by the Clerk of the Crown suspicion would naturally arise.

The Toronto public are considering in what manner permanent honor shall be done to the men of that Province who fell in South Africa. The Canadian Architect and Builder has taken the matter up and after soliciting opinions from many of its readers, favors a memorial arch to be erected at the entrance to Queen Square. An arch of solid masonry surmounted by a statue of the Queen, appears to be the general idea. This has been objected to on the ground that to be carried out it would involve a cost of \$25,000 to \$50,000. Another proposal is the erection of a bronze statue in the uniform worn by the Canadian soldiers. Dr. Ryerson favors the arch. Nothing appears yet to have been decided upon.
