

It must have been a staggering blow to the evening organ to read the Canadian Press despatch, in its own columns, announcing Premier Bennett's declaration in the House of Commons, that the Government were going to fulfill all their pre-election promises.

The exponent of Canadian work for the Yankoes has waxed fierce and eloquent denouncing the Ottawa Government for putting the "Dumping clause" in force against foreign fruits of the kind now produced in Canada, and sheds crocodile tears over the increased (?) cost to consumers. It must hit the dreamer hard to visit our fruit stores and note that the prices of native Canadian fruits; plums, peaches, grapes, pears, apples, tomatoes, onions, etc., are in most cases lower, and in all cases as low as under the pro-American policy King government policy. There was no such a let up during the election, and the "laid up," like the hold up following the Bell Government's defeat, commenced while the defeated King Government was still holding office. Its a common trick of the local Liberal press to try and saddle the sins of its own party upon its successors.

"Pincher Creek has been said to be 'very much oil-minded these days,' and we should say, 'extremely so.'"

Information gleaned during the visit of the Board of Trade to the immense new venture of Alberta Gas & Fuel is that the company is ready now to make a stupendous final test. They have already drilled five deep test wells in this vicinity but in the development of Yarrow No. 1 the preparatory outlay alone has been a small fortune. The road in from the highway has cost \$2,000, and the months of diamond drill boring in which 17 holes varying to a total depth of 10,000 feet, a perfect strata sample record of which has been preserved, is outstanding in oil development in this field. L. H. McClung, chief engineer, is now in charge, and Mr. McClung is said to be not only an engineer of Oklahoma, his home state, and of Prince Edward Island, from whence he came recently, but is of the parent body (the Doherty Oil Co.) and is mostly highly esteemed by them.

With a large Union Jack grandly furled to the breeze on its topmost point the giant derrick of Yarrow No. 1, Alberta Gas & Fuel Co. Ltd. subsidiary of the world-famed Doherty Oil Company, situated in a majestic setting of the Canadian Rockies made a wonderful view when the company's representatives received a large delegation of the members of Pincher Creek Board of Trade at 3 p. m. on Wednesday, August 27th. Quite a number of the members were accompanied by their wives and some with members of their family also. As the party assembled they were greeted by the powerhouse whistle blowing a prolonged "Hello."

Mr. Ivan Y. Reddin did the honors for the company and bade everyone a most cordial welcome; then calling Mr. McClung to his aid they escorted the party through the plant.

Here following an extended description of the plant, after which the account continues:

"Mr. Reddin still leading the way, invited everyone to the cook house across the river. The habitation of the core drillers, in the meantime having continued in service as such. Here we found Mrs. Reddin and her assistants who cordially welcomed us to tea. Mr. Reddin assisted and nowhere could a more genial host and hostess have been found.
