COURT OF APPEAL RESCRIPT AGAINST R. B. RUSSEL

WINNIPEG, March 4.—The written judgments of the Courts of Appeal in the case of R. B. Russel, strike leader, now serving a two year term of imprisonment, have now been filed. Chief Justice Perdue says:

"The accused has been found guilty upon all the counts set forth in the indictment. There was sufficient evidence to justify the jury in making their findings. In fact, they could not have honestly arrived at any other conclusion. So far from being a legitimate strike, the strike shown was in fact, as the jury has found a seditious conspiracy. To aid a brother trade union in its strike for higher wages, or to obtain a higher wage for all, was not the real object of the combination. What took place before the strike shows that the accused and his associate Red Society aimed at something much more drastic. Their ultimate purpose, as declared in the public speeches, was revolution, the overthrow of constitutional government in Canada, and the introduction of a form of socialistic or Soviet rule in its place. This was to be accomplished by general strikes, force and terror, and, if necessary, by bloodshed."

Council of Premiers Has Adjourned

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, March 4.—The council of premiers which adjourned the session here last night, may reassemble toward the end of next week. Premier Nitte will be leaving for Rome today where his presence is needed urgently because of the international situation. The council, it was announced, has completed a treaty of peace with Turkey which will be presented to the Turkish Delegates at Paris on March 22.

Permanent Comm. on Steamer Traffic

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, March 4.—A resolution which, if carried into effect by parliament, would institute steps for the formation of a permanent commission to govern all ocean steamship traffic between ports in the United Kingdom and ports in Canada, is to be brought before the House in a few days by Mr. J. Armstrong, Labton.

Quebec Women Will Vote April 7

(Special to The Guardian.) MONTREAL, March 4.—For the first time in the history of the province of Quebec women will exercise the franchise, the occasion being the coming of two federal by-elections on April 7, in the province. The only qualifications are that they must be over the age of 21 and British subjects.

Unionist Caucus Next Tuesday

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, March 4.—A full caucus of the Unionist party will be summoned for next week, probably for Tuesday, though the notices have not yet been set out. The whole situation will come up for discussion.

Britain's Loans to Her Allies

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, March 4.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer Austen Chamberlain announces that Britain's cash advances to Allies since the signing of the armistice amount to £159,500,000 sterling.

Italy Wants to Trade With Russia

ROME, March 4.—Deputy Bombaci and former Deputy Carlini left for Copenhagen today accompanied by delegates of Italian cooperative societies to open negotiations with Maxim Litvinoff, Russian Soviet representative. The Italian delegates, it was said, will attempt to reach an agreement with the Bolshevik representative by which trade may be resumed immediately between Italy and Russia.

United States Stands By Prohibition

WASHINGTON, March 4.—By an overwhelming vote the House today refused to repeal the Volstead Prohibition law. This action came on the motion of representative Evan, Democrat, New Jersey, to discontinue all prohibition appropriations on July 1 and to repeal the Volstead enforcement law at that time. The vote was 254 to 86.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Feb. 17.—A merger of the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Burlington Railroads into one great transcontinental system after Government control is relinquished this month was forecast in high railroad circles today. It is reported that the merger is being planned along lines conceived by the late James J. Hill.

James G. Murphy, a C. N. R. brakeman, while attending to his duties about three o'clock this morning, sustained injuries from falling beneath the engine of his train at Beaver Brook, from which he died about five or six hours, later in the Miramichi Hospital. Murphy was riding on the engine and when he jumped off to turn the switch to let his train into the siding, he missed his footing and fell beneath the engine. An arm and leg were severed and he was injured about the head. He was rushed to the hospital at Newcastle where he succumbed to his injuries. Deceased was 29 years of age and leaves a wife. His parents reside at Jacquet River.

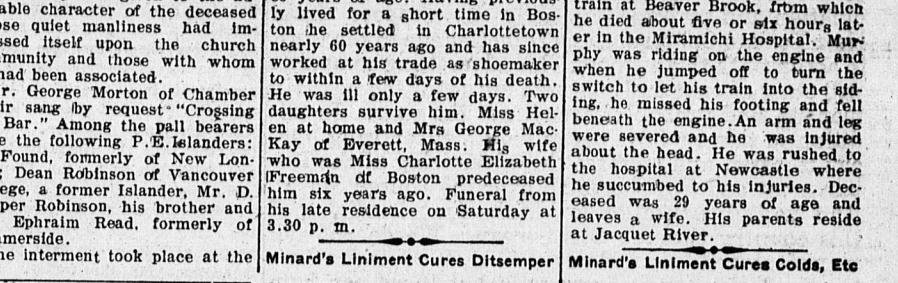
