The enraged mother then attempted to force her way to the dock, and the father joined her to get at the prisoner. Boyd made his escape and the child's parents were finally overpowered by the police and forced from the court.

ARMENIANS SEND OUT URGENT CALL FOR ASSISTANCE

Refugees at Hadjin Said to be in Danger of Mafacare—British Squadron in the Bosphorus

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 13.—The Armenian leader at Hadjin, northwest of Marash, has sent the following despatches to the Armenian committee at Constantinople: "March (date missing)—Take immediate steps for relief. We shall be annihilated." "March 6—We beg you for the last time, as danger is imminent, do all you can. We shall be massacred. Come to our relief." There are approximately 7,000 Armenian refugees in Hadjin. Three women members of the Armenian committee for the relief in the near east are also there.

A British squadron of five super-dreadnoughts of the Revenge class, which has been cruising in the engaging in target practice in the Sea of Marmora, and along the Syrian coast for several days returned to Constantinople and anchored in the Bosphorus this morning.

SENSE OF SPEED.

W. P. Beazell says in an article in a New York paper, telling some of his flying experiences: "Very little sense of speed comes to one in the air. There is, of course, the tremendous rush of air past one's face, but a whirling propeller will give that before one has left the ground. There are no landmarks in the air, and it is by landmarks that we measure the speed of trains and automobiles, for instance. The earth is so far below that it seems to be passing at about the rapidity of a horse car. After a time the landlubber begins to realize that what he was regarding as suburban plots are really farms, that the fish ponds are town reservoirs, that the brooks are rivers, and that by holding out his hands he can blot from view a county. When that happens he begins to get a proper perspective of himself."

CANADIAN MASCOT NOW A ZOO BEAR, CALLED BIGAMOUS

The London Daily Mail says: "Won't the Canadians be shocked? 'Teddy,' their mascot black bear (deposited by them as an apparently innocent cub), has proved a brazen bigamist. Last week it was announced that 'Teddy' had met and mated with West in the hat and moustache of a Russian brown bear, and that a fine pair of mahogany cubs were in the nursery—the first black-brown bear hybrids ever born in this country. Beyond questioning the desirability of mixed marriages most people let the matter rest there.

Now there is a second Russian bear in 'Teddy's' enclosure, and a few days ago she jealously told 'Daisy' that she wanted half the nursery for another pair of mahogany hybrids. 'Daisy,' whose spirit seems to have been broken, let the new mother in without protest. One of the younger twins has just died of bronchitis, but the survivor is thriving, together with his hybrid half-brothers. The two sisters-in-law (or whatever their relationship may be) are making the best of things. 'Teddy' (who is shut off from the nursery) begs for buns on the ground of heavy responsibilities—and eats them himself, but he has an apprehensive look. Some day that iron nursery gate will be opened and the mother bears will be able to call him an "unblinking, bun-begging, bigamous black-guard."—L. G. M.

VICTORIA, March 19.—Premier Oliver has promised to submit to the people of British Columbia a clear, distinct issue upon the question of prohibition or the sale of liquor under control.

Three suggested amendments to the prohibition amendment act will be considered, namely, a contrary act drafted by the Government on suggestions or a framework submitted by the moderatists, and a moderate act to be framed by the Government for which it will accept responsibility.


