THE PANAMA CANAL.

Since the report of the Canal Commissioners last year the conviction has gained ground in the United States that the Panama route would be decidedly preferable to that of Nicaragua, as well as considerably cheaper of construction. This feeling was strengthened when it became known that the Panama Canal Company which had expended so many millions on the uncompleted work is willing to sell its rights and property to the United States at a moderate figure and at great loss to the present owners.

But before the Washington Government can enter upon such a purchase certain rights must be secured from Colombia through whose territory the route passes. An effort has been made to secure this by treaty with Columbia, but the latter wants a big money price and is reluctant to make the necessary concessions. We regard this as unfortunate, for the Panama route is undoubtedly the best for the United States and the world, and as a canal must be built, the delays and obstructions may cause the construction to be undertaken by the less favorable Nicaragua route.

A curious combination of interests is noted as working to defeat the Bond-Hay treaty. As is well known the beet sugar interests in the Republic are most desirous to defeat the Cuban reciprocity treaty and so prevent the competition of Cuban sugar. The Boston Herald notes that the beet sugar interests are now working with the fishing interests of Gloucester with the object of defeating both treaties and with renewed hopes of success.

It appears that as a result of the conference between Mr. Stumbles and the Queen's County representatives the Minto was ordered back to Charlottetown yesterday, but the slight storm was sufficient to prevent her coming, and at this writing we are left in doubt as to her future movements. In this connection it may be mentioned that many and loud complaints were made at the recent Tignish banquet by western men as to the connection between the railway and the Minto when plying to this port. The complainants objected that the cost of trucking and wharfage here form a serious handicap to shippers while at Georgetown this is avoided by direct transfer from the cars to the steamers. Before another season, if the Minto is to run to and from this port, as she ought to do, the necessary wharf and warehouse accommodation must be provided so that the Government Railway and the Government steamer can make close connection without the present costly system of team-hauling.

It is worthy to note that of the 127,891 persons from the United States who within the past few years have entered the Canadian Northwest as settlers 84,493 have already been naturalized. This is two-thirds of the total, and a much larger proportion of those who arrived before 1902. Many of the latter have been too busy to attend to a matter in which there is no need of haste. In the end eight out of ten who came northward across the border will take the necessary legal steps to make themselves Canadians and British subjects. And every one of them will find himself quite as free and independent and quite as fairly and justly governed in this glorious Dominion as ever he was under the Stars and Stripes. We have no fear of the "American invasion." The new comers from the South will soon be counted among our most contented and loyal fellow-subjects and citizens.

It has been remarked that the roll of distinguished men and women about the world who departed this life in 1902 is not so long as usual, but it includes Zola, Cecil Rhodes, Krupp, Admiral Sampson, Lord Panncofote King Albert of Saxony and others of lesser note.

A statistical work has been published in St. Petersburg which shows that of the 11,112 persons employed on the Siberian Railway, over 1,000 were convicts who had been banished for murder, robbery, burglary or other heinous offences, 597 being for murder. These thousand criminals are employed, not as laborers and trackmen, but as conductors, guards, station masters, etc. Of the total 11,112 only 473 had ever attended a secondary school and only about 4,000 had ever attended a school of any kind, the remaining 7,000 being unable to read or write. Recently a large number of the employees have been summarily dismissed. If the facts are half as bad as stated the Siberian Railway is not likely to become a favorite route with the travelling public, even if it were a well-built and well-equipped road, which is far from being the case.

The Toronto World notes the difficulty in that city of procuring postage stamps at night. The same inconvenience is experienced in this city. In fact where the mails arrive in the evening and go out in the early morning it is at night time that stamps are most in demand. The annoyance and inconvenience of being unable to buy, borrow or beg a stamp in the later hours of the evening is a serious one to many who do not keep a supply on hand or whose stock of stamps has given out. Some of the drug-stores, which are usually open late, do what they can in an obliging way to help over the difficulty, but there is a strong feeling that the regular vendor's stand should be kept open to supply the public need. We do not wish to fix the blame on anybody, but at the hours when people most congregate to receive their mails there is no opportunity to buy a stamp. This ought not so to be. Most persons would be willing that the stamp office should remain closed till 3 p. m. if only it would be kept from 8 till 11 p. m. But both by day and in the evening there should be an opportunity to buy postage stamps when needed.
