Lieut. Commandant F. M. Jeffrey, R.C.N.V.R. Staff Officer for Sea Cadets Services in Canada under Capt. E. R. Brock, Officer Commanding Reserve Divisions, Toronto, arrived in the city Sunday night. A rifle range with a 600 yard range and a target range, a government project now under construction on the shore of Hillsboro Bay at the foot of "T" hill. Due to the labor shortage a number of men from the Engineering Works Co., Halifax, were sent to assist in the work of this project. About 35 men are employed altogether.

The death occurred in Charlottetown early yesterday morning of Mrs. J. E. B. MacCreedy. Mrs. MacCreedy was perhaps the best known, and one of the most highly respected women in the Province, having entered largely into public life in various capacities, religious, educational, patriotic, social, and recreational. A daughter of the late Rev. James Benjamin D. St. John, N.B., she took an active interest in the affairs of the City of St. John's, being especially with its various societies, especially the Women's Missionary Society. She was greatly interested in young people's work, and from the outset formed part of the committee of the Girl Guide movement here.

A number of years ago several ladies joined together for literary and social enjoyment and organized the Women's Club which acquired accommodation in the Canadian Bank of Commerce building and at which there were monthly lectures and discussions on literary and public questions. Mrs. MacCreedy was for several years president, and one of the chief sources of inspiration. Later, when the Study Lovers' Club was formed, she became an interested member in its group.

Mrs. MacCreedy was Regent of the Royal Edward Chapter, I.O. O. F. and was a member of the organization in connection with the Army and Navy. In this connection she was a member of the Study Lovers' Club, which was formed in 1910. Mrs. MacCreedy was a member of the Queen Mary Needlework Guild, which has supplied innumerable articles of clothing and orphans here and in England. She was Honorary President of the Women's National Conservative Association here for many years. She was also a member of the Red Cross Society and Navy League, and one of the oldest members of the Charlottetown Golf Club. In recognition of her long association with patriotic and other work, she was awarded the King George V. Jubilee Medal, which she greatly prized. Her endowments with varied tastes and talents, she was a great lover of life and people, had many friends here and elsewhere, and was ever hospitable and charitable. Active and energetic up to the last, she was stricken with a heart condition only a short time before her death.
