SHIPWRECKS AND SEA COLLISIONS

Accidents by Which Many Lives Are Lost

A Collision at Sea Costs the Lives of Twenty or More People-- American Fishing Schooner Goes Ashore.

AMERICAN SCHOONER LOST. CANNO, May 6. (Special).--The American fishing schooner Gloriana from Gloucester went ashore on Thum Cape near White Point.

The Captain and fourteen of the men were lost, three were saved. The vessel is in pieces.

A COLLISION AT SEA.

NORFOLK, Va., May 6.--A collision at sea that cost the lives of twenty or more people and the sinking of the Clyde steamship Saginaw by the Old Dominion Steamship Company's liner Hamilton, occurred between the winter quarter Light Ship and Farwick Island Light Ship on the Virginia coast at 4.30 o'clock yesterday morning during a fog.

A TRUE BILL RETURNED.

LIVERPOOL, May 6.--The Grand Jury returned a true bill against Otto Monsen, Gustave Rau, Alias Angus Malhan, and William Smith, Alias Dirkherlaar, seaman of the British barque Veronica of St. John, N. B. from Ship Island, Mass. who were indicted on the charges of murder and arson. The Veronica was burned at sea December 29th.

STUDY COURSE FOR TEACHERS

Advance Along the Line of Sunday School Work.

Books for Study in the Coming Season--Diplomas will be Granted on the Completion of the Course.

The Executive of the P. E. Island S. S. Association have purchased four sets of books comprising the International training course for Primary and Junior Teachers. Each set contains the following books:

- 1 "A Study of Child Nature"--Elizabeth Harrison.
2 "S. S. Teachers' Normal Course"--G. W. Pease.
3 "The Point of Contact in Teaching"--Paerson Du Bois.
4 "Teaching and Teachers"--H. C. Trumbull, D. D.
5 "Practical Primary Plans"--Israel P. Black.

Upon the completion of this course, and a satisfactory examination, a diploma will be issued by the International Primary Department and will be given in connection with the Provincial Convention. It is hoped that many of our teachers will in time procure this diploma, and thus show their appreciation of the privilege afforded them by the S. S. Association.

For the present these sets of books will be circulated in each County and in the City of Charlottetown. Later each District Association may purchase a set which would give fifteen sets for the Province, thus affording ample opportunity for all teachers to enjoy the course.

Primary and junior teachers wishing to read these books should apply to the following Secretaries at once: Prince County--Miss Carrie Inman, Bedeque.

Queens County--Miss Jeanette McLeod, Hunter River. Kings County--James D. McLeod, Montague.

Charlottetown--Miss Marian Watson. Those taking the books are to conform to the following regulations.

- 1 Each book must not be retained for a longer period than three weeks.
2 The person receiving a book must, at the expiration of three weeks, forward it in accordance with instructions received from the County Secretary.
3 No pencil or pen marks shall be made in the book, nor should the leaves be turned down, and the person receiving the book is responsible to the Association for its loss or injury.

No fee is charged for the privilege of studying the books, but the persons reading them must forward them promptly paying postage if forwarded by mail.

If any one would like to own copies of these books they may be purchased from the Field Secretary, G. P. Raymond, Charlottetown. Any other information concerning the course of study will be given by the Provincial Primary Superintendent, Miss Ethel B. Conners, Summerside.

FOREST FIRES CAUSE LOSSES.

THE DISTURBANCE IN MACEDONIA

The Government is Held Responsible for Outrages

Fights Continue on the Streets and Women Take a Prominent Part in the Bomb Outrages--Big Naval Expenditure.

IRRITATION IS GROWING.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 6. (Special).--The irritation against Bulgaria in the official circles is constantly growing and the Government has been formally notified in the most vigorous language that the Porte holds it responsible for the outrages arising from the freedom of action which the Macedonian agitators living in Bulgaria have been allowed.

STREET FIGHTS CONTINUE. Advice from Salonica say that notwithstanding the fact that hundreds of Bulgarians have been arrested, street fights are constantly taking place.

THE BOMB OUTRAGES.

Women and children, especially young girls, take a prominent part in the bomb outrages, which have been planned in all the towns of Macedonia.

PEOPLE FEAR MASSACRE. Bombs have been discovered in the houses at U-kub in European Turkey where the Turkish population is greatly excited fearing a massacre.

LARGE NAVAL EXPENDITURE.

JOKIO, Japan, May 6. (Special).--The projected naval program prepares the expenditure of \$5,750,000 per year for ten years.

THE SITUATION IN MONTREAL

More Men Are Threatening That They Will Strike

The Companies Offer to Accede to Demands But Strikers Won't Comply--Gamey Enquiry Adjournd.

NO CHANGE IN SITUATION.

MONTREAL, May 6. (Special).--There is practically no change in the strike situation since the telegrams of yesterday. It is believed that the Grand Trunk breakmen will go out by the end of the week. Two hundred carters including a hundred coal carters struck today.

TO MAKE IT A CRIME.

The Board of Trade is preparing a bill asking Parliament to make it a crime for any body to strike unless that body be incorporated.

STRIKERS WILL NOT ACCED.

Some shipping firms have offered to accede to all the demands today if the men go to work but the union declined to accede unless all strikers were taken back.

TORONTO, May 6. (Special).--The Gamey enquiry adjourned this afternoon until Tuesday next when the Counsel's addresses will be made.

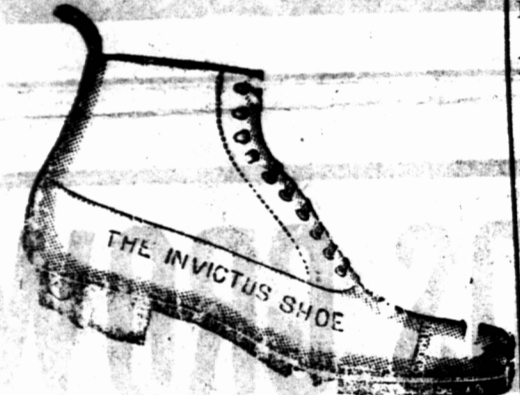
