Latest invasion Has little effect On London markets

LONDON, April 7.—(AP)—Security prices tended lower today, but on the whole the "city" displayed a firm front to news of the invasion of Yugoslavia. British government bonds were marked down at the outset, but later developed resistance. Recent demand for Japanese bonds dried up and quotations slumped. The industrial group was tepid. Kaffirs were adjusted to Cape Town prices, but local selling failed to appear in volume. Domestic rails were trimmed fractions. Oils held steady.

Because of the anticipated heavy volume of pre-arranged messages, patrons are being asked to file their messages at an early date to ensure delivery during the Easter holiday.

No change in Coleman strike

COLEMAN, Alta., April 7.—(CP)—Despite a warning from the Dominion Minister of Labor that the strike is illegal, no change appeared in the position of the miners at the McGilivray and International Coal Mines in this Crow's Nest Pass town. Labor Minister McLaughlin said in a telegram to Robert Livett of Calgary, president of district 18, United Mine Workers of America, stating that under the industrial disputes investigation act the strike was illegal, but no investigation by a conciliation board. The telegram also urged that the men be advised to return to work. In an interview at Calgary today, Mr. Livett said, "unless there is a conference and a contract such as we have in every steam coal field in Alberta, I don't think there is much hope of the men returning to work. The Coleman dispute is primarily concerned with a question of 'closed shop'."

New T. C. A. Schedule is Announced

The new Trans-Canada Air Lines schedule as affecting Prince Edward Island, was fully approved on Friday morning last, and the following schedule will be of great interest to the people of the province. The new schedule goes into effect on April 15 and is as follows: On the first trip, the plane leaves Charlottetown Airport at 7:00 a.m., arriving in Moncton at 2:00 p.m. It leaves Summerside at 7:30, arriving in Moncton at 8:15. On the second trip, the plane leaves Moncton at 11 o'clock, arriving in Summerside at 11:50, leaving the western capital, the plane arrives at the Charlottetown airport at 12:15. The plane leaves on return to Moncton at 12:45, arriving at Summerside at 1:05 p.m., leaving at 1:10 a.m. on the final flight of the day the plane will leave Moncton at 5:05, arriving at Summerside 50 minutes later. After a stop of five minutes, it will proceed to Charlottetown, arriving here at 6:20 p.m. All schedules are daily except Sundays.

60 per cent Of Partridge Survive winter

Royal Canadian Mounted Police who have just completed a two weeks' check on game conditions report that at least 60 per cent of the Hungarian Partridge have wintered safely. The patrol extended from Conway in Prince County to Souris and Fortune in Kings' County. The past winter was the most severe since the Huns were introduced in 1927 and the survival of the birds is attributed mainly to the help given by residents of the country districts. A score or more pheasants survived in the area immediately south of the Hillsboro River, but where the Huns are counted in thousands. The annual spring migration of Canada Geese is well underway. A flock of 15 remained all winter at Little Harbour in Kings' County and a smaller flock wintered at Clark's Creek in Queen's County. These are undoubtedly the geese that were reported at intervals in February and early March.

come and personal allowances, but the maximum rebate from a year's income is 65%. Extended to industry, this provision takes the form of maintaining the much-criticized 100-per cent excess profits tax but estimated increased income tax, less deduction for income tax, "o assist in reconstruction." Reduction of personal allowances and exemptions will sweep an additional 2,000,000 taxpayers into the treasury dragnet and the total effect of the changes will bring an estimated increase in income tax of 600,000,000. Half of this sum will be credited to the taxpayers. Sir Kingsley described the budget as the second since he succeeded Sir John Simon at the Treasury - as one of "domestic expenditure" because the figures do not take into account increased income tax in the United States under the Lease-Lend Bill. The estimate also excluded payments to be made to the United States in exchange for "amounts of payments in the United States under existing orders." Sir Kingsley said "before the end of the financial year, the total beyond the figure of 55,000,000,000, which I have seen mentioned in various quarters." The new basic tax rate of 10 shillings in the pound, or 50 per cent, of taxable income, compares with the last year's high of six shillings in the pound, or 30 per cent. The net taxation, Sir Kingsley explained, means that the "income tax and surtax will reach a total of 55 shillings, six pence in the pound on the highest incomes, a figure now approaching in that sphere to the limit of taxation. To enjoy a tax free income of £5,000 a year, it will be necessary to have a gross income of £6,000," he said.
