# Crop Report

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned:

**General**

In Prairie Provinces good harvesting weather has prevailed during the past week, and threshing is in full swing where not already completed. Notwithstanding previous wet weather grains generally continue good. Considerable ploughing has been done in Ontario; threshing is practically completed and corn is nearly all cut. All crops are heavy and of good quality. In Quebec threshing is well advanced and yields of all crops satisfactory. In the Maritime Provinces the weather is favorable for harvesting and all crops good except potatoes. In British Columbia threshing is about completed, but crops of both cereals and fruit are below average.

**Prairie Provinces.**

Edmonton District.—Threshing practically completed, wheat grading well in most sections, yields estimated 5 to 15 bushels; oats and barley very light; pasture improved. Calgary District.—Shovery weather somewhat delayed threshing, but operations again in full swing. Estimated yields northeast section 3 to 7 and other parts 12 to 15 bushels. Lethbridge District.—Harvesting completed; threshing delayed by rain, 30 per cent. completed. Yields generally not up to expectations. Wheat varies from 4 bushels at Bow Island to 20 and 30 bushels in the region of Raymond, Warman and Cardston. Saskatchewan District.—Cutting completed, threshing progressing rapidly, yield up to expectations and grading well. Regina District.—Some late course grains yet to be cut; threshing in full swing, but not more than 25 per cent. completed. Yield and grade satisfactory. Winnipeg District.—Threshing should be completed in a week or ten days. Grain receipts are heavy—between September 14 and 25 over 20,000 cars handled compared with about 12,000 last year.

**Province of Quebec.**

Threshing is practically completed, grain crops being above average and of good quality. Corn is nearly all cut, and silos are being filled, heavy crop; conditions are generally favorable for ploughing and seeding of winter crops. Fall wheat showing out of the ground in some places looks in good condition, average acreage indicated; second and third cuttings of hay are good. Roots in good condition; yields in all cases will be heavy and of good quality; fruit, very heavy crop of peaches, plums and early apples, grapes good, winter apples only fair, pasture in excellent condition, feed plentiful for wintering cattle.

**Maritime Provinces.**

Weather conditions have continued favorable for harvesting. All crops are good except potatoes which are showing results of rot and blight; apples in quantity are fully up to estimate and are of good quality and color.

**RIGHT TO IMPORT LIQUOR INTO ONTARIO UNDER ARGUMENT**

TORONTO, Oct. 4.—The right to import liquor into Ontario, and to transport it from place to place within the province, is discussed in the statement of claim and statement of defence which have been filed at Osborne Hall in the suit by John T. Smith against the Attorney General. Mr. Smith, a resident of Toronto, asks a declaration of the court that he is entitled to import and transport liquor in spite of the order of the Governor General of June 18, 1921, prohibiting it. The defence takes the ground that no writ can be issued against the Attorney General, as such, any more than against the crown itself. For this reason, it is said, the court has no jurisdiction. The case is proceeding.
