DAISIES TO DECK JUNE MARRIAGE.

The Church of the Epiphany, Parkdale, will be the scene of a fashionable wedding at 6 o'clock this evening, when Rev. E. I. The church will be artistically decorated by the hands of the bride's many girl friends. The aisle will be lined with palms, on which will be strewn syringa blossoms. The pews for the guests will be distinguished by garlands of daisies caught at the end of each pew by white satin ribbons. Miss Bryan will preside at the organ, playing during the ceremony.

The bride, who will be escorted by her father, will wear a handsome gown of white duchesse satin. The skirt made with a court train, has three tiny ruchings of white chiffon ribbon. The tucked chiffon yoke is outlined by a bertha of real lace, and the double sleeves have a drapery of accordeon-pleated chiffon.
