  - 11:35-12:05 noon Drive from Provincial Sanatorium via North River Road, Brighton Road, Euston Street, Longworth Avenue, Mount Edward Road to the Experimental Farm.
  - 12:05-12:25 p.m. Shown about the Experimental Farm. His Excellency will plant an English Oak tree.
  - 12:25-12:30 p.m. Drive from Experimental Farm to C. N. R. Station.
  - 1:30 p.m. Leave for Summerside via Weymouth, Grafton, Great George Streets, Elm Avenue, and Malpeque Road.
  - 2:35 p.m. Arrive Summerside.
  - 3:35-4:05 p.m. Civic reception in Town Square—Legionnaires, Scouts, Guides, Brownies, and Cubs will be assembled. Address of Welcome and reply by His Excellency. (If weather unsuitable this reception to be held in Summerside High School).
  - 4:05-4:15 p.m. Drive from reception point to Experimental Fox Ranch.
  - 4:15-4:25 p.m. Leave about Fox Ranch.
  - 4:25 p.m. Arrive Legion Home and partake of Afternoon Tea.
  - 4:30-4:45 p.m. Leave Summerside for Charlottetown via Central, Water Streets, and Kensington, etc.
  - 4:50 p.m. Arrive at C.N.R. Station, Charlottetown via Elm Avenue, Euston and Weymouth Streets.
  - 5:00 p.m. Drive from C. N. R. Station to Charlottetown Hotel via Weymouth and Kent Streets.
  - 5:05-5:30 p.m. Dinner—Guests of the Province of Prince Edward Island. Short address of welcome by the Premier, Honourable J. Walter Jones, and a reply by His Excellency.

### Australian Labor Party's Campaign

CANBERRA, Australia, Sept. 21 (CP) — (Advance) — After five years in office, the Australian Labor party is campaigning for re-election Sept. 23 on a domestic platform of continued protection for the modest worker and wage-earner and expansion of a \$200,000,000 social service program. Led by 61-year-old Prime Minister Joseph Benoit Chifley who 14 months ago succeeded Labor's wartime Prime Minister John Curtin, the party offers no "extraneous promises."

While most of the campaign discussion so far has been with issues of domestic policy, a large part of the Labor platform, as outlined by Prime Minister Chifley, is devoted to foreign affairs, external trade and Australian defence.

Through the voice of External Affairs Minister Herbert V. Evatt, the Labor Party claims to have given Australia its first real foreign policy based on support for the United Nations and co-operation with Britain with whom it claims relations have never been "more realistic or more cordially reciprocal."

**Empire Preference Stressed**  
Labor declares its policy for foreign trade to follow the same line—co-operation in the organization of international trade without losing sight of the advantages Australia has gained under the system of Empire preference by which it disposes of its most important exports, wool, meat, wheat and dairy products.

The Prime Minister in his policy speech, said Australia's big lesson of the war was its vulnerability. The Labor government proposed that Australia should become a vital link in a powerful chain of bases protecting the British way of life throughout the world.

Placing its five-year wartime and domestic record before the electorate, these are some of the accomplishments for which Labor takes credit.

Demobilization within 12 months of the end of the war of 500,000 of the country's 600,000 servicemen and women without unemployment of more than one half of one per cent.
