A REAL CENSORSHIP THAT WILL PRODUCE RESULTS

While Bernard Shaw and the English dramatists are kicking up a dreadful dust about time-dishonored British censorship of plays, some women in Chicago have devised a form of censorship which promises to hit the producers of indecent stage shows at their only vulnerable point—the pocketbook, says the Brooklyn Eagle. The women's clubs of Chicago are forming a league and have appointed a committee to report upon the morality, or otherwise, of plays presented to Chicago theaters. If this committee decides that a play is not fit to be seen, its reports will be sent to all clubs in the league, and the club members promise to boycott the theater at which the offensive piece was sheltered. The plan is simplicity itself, and if the women carry out their pledge not to go to subsequent plays at a theater which has sheltered one of those masses of filth which are just now making so much money, it will be highly effective. The immediate effect of announcing a woman's boycott upon any play because of its indecency would be, of course, to crowd the theater where the piece was given. Any advertisement of dirt produces that result, so that managers frequently advertise indecencies which they fail to present. But under our system of theatrical booking a good and highly desirable play may follow such a piece as "The Girl From Rector's," or "The Queen of the Moulin Rouge." If a manager believes that the patronage represented by the combined women's clubs of his city will cut out his house altogether after he has offered one of those atrocities he will think twice before he gives them his house room. Filth would thus be left to the theaters which do not look for an intelligent or cultivated patronage, and the ban upon the houses where it is permitted would be easy. If the plan works as well as it promises in Chicago, it will certainly spread.

Of the conditions of the steel trade in the United States, the New York Journal of Commerce says: "The steel trade is booming as it never boomed before. Capacity for production is the greatest in history, yet it cannot cope with the volume of business now pressing upon manufacturers. Prices are back to the levels that prevailed before the collapse. Premiums are offered for prompt delivery. Every skilled iron and steel worker in the country is employed. The tariff revision that the trade feared has proved innocuous. Foreign rivalry is negligible and at home the lion and the lambs are locked in friendly embrace, their only regret being that that wicked thing known as competition should ever have disturbed their amicable relations. As for the value of steel securities, they never were so high as they are today. Steel is short, is wearing the plumes, the robes and the airs of a prince, instead of the rags of a pauper. The future is without the shadow of cloud—nothing but expanding trade and waxing dividends are in sight. The methods of big business advertisers are to be adopted by the combined Protestant Churches of the United States. Early in the New Year they will begin a campaign of advertising social, racial, economic and religious problems which imperil American life and American institutions. The mediums employed will be newspapers, magazines, periodicals and books, and on posters and billboards. Advertising will be inaugurated under the Home Missions Council, representing a membership of about 18,000,000, and a constituency of 40,000,000 or more. It will be directed to the public at large; and such topics as the labor question, the immigration problem, the negro problem, and conditions in city and town will be discussed in the advertisements. The campaign will be conducted under the general supervision of the Rev. Charles Stetzel, superintendent of the Presbyterian Department of Church and Labor.—Ex.

DRYDOCK PROPOSALS. OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—Proposals for the establishment in Canada at Lewis and St. John of dry docks and shipyards involving an expenditure of 46,000,000—three and three-quarter millions at Lewis and two and one-half millions at St. John—and the creation of great Canadian shipbuilding industries were laid before the Government by an influential deputation, representing the shipping interests of Montreal, Quebec and St. John, with their British associates, including the world-famous shipbuilding firm of Harland & Wolff and the great contracting firm of McArthur-Perks.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—The annual report of the Postmaster General shows the number of letters and post cards handled during the year increased by 19,805,000, or over four per cent as compared with the preceding twelve months. The number of post offices increased by 656, and there was an increase of 2,034 miles in the system over which the mails were carried. The revenue of the Department was \$809,237 in excess of the expenditure. Stamp issues totalled \$9,916,011, an increase of \$30,000, or a little over 6 per cent. The introduction of the one cent drop letter rate in cities was responsible for a very large increase in letters for local delivery. The total number of one cent stamps issued was 51,326,000.
