THREE FAST CLASSES FOR ST. PETERS RACING JULY 18

About a year ago St. Peters went on the racing map of Prince Edward Island by staging good races over a nicely located and well appointed race track and grounds. Encouraged by the success they met with last year they are putting on a more ambitious program this year on Wednesday, July 18th. For the past two weeks they have been working on the race track and grounds, and by the 18th will have everything in apple pie order.

It will be remembered that Acac-laville trotted in 2:18 1-4 over this same course and with this year's tuning up the track will no doubt be many seconds faster, so that good time will be made. The races will be all on the three heat plan, every heat a race, which means that from the very word Go, everyone will be hiking to get the best possible position so as to collect some of the money that particular heat. Laying up in the three heat plan is a losing proposition. It will also mean that the races will be over in good time so that the spectators will not witness any tiresome, long drawn out contests.

The program decided on consists of a 2:20 Trot which will bring together Blair Mac, Peter Verde, Princess Aubrey, Don Dix and others. The 2:24 Class Pace is made so that Marge Direct can meet Major Aubrey, Teddy Jackson, Bud Asor, and worthy, Zelma Dewey, Dixie Marquie and Gordon Harvester. The 2:29 Trot will have the largest list of entries as there are no less than eight horses undergoing preparation for it in King's County.

The foregoing will give an idea of the race program which will be handled by capable officials and starter. The refreshment end, which is one of the vital things connected with a race meeting in the country, is being taken care of by the Women's League of St. Peters. These ladies will be remembered for the excellent repast they provided last year. In addition to good meals served in a most appetizing way in cool arbor covered booths, there will be ice cream and soft-drinks salons with

plenty of fruit to cater to the thirsty ones between meals. Mr. Albert Quigley, the general Secretary, and Mr. G. J. McInnis, the President, are popular and painstaking officials who are intent on giving the public the very best in sport and treating everybody right royally. They have made an arrangement with the Railway to provide a special train to carry race horses and passengers on Wednesday morning. It will leave Charlottetown at nine o'clock and will returning leave St. Peters at 7:30. Those who do not care to go by automobile will therefore be afforded an excellent outing in comfortable passenger coaches via the Railway trip.

Twenty-one new stalls have been built for race horses and hay and oats will be provided so that even these incidentals need be carried by the visiting horsemen.

In Memoriam

MRS. JAMES G. HUGHES.

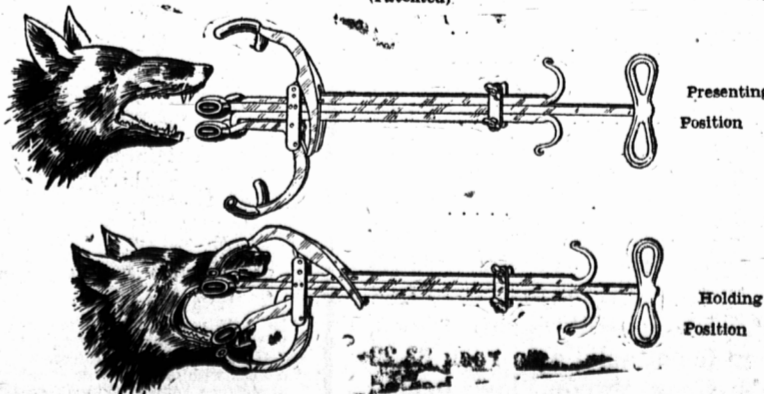
The passing to her heavenly reward of Mrs. James G. Hughes, (Bessie Hannah Cook) on May 19, 1928, in the sixty-eighth year of her age, has been an increasingly felt loss to her loved ones and neighbors of Covehead. Mrs. Hughes was a woman of outstanding Christian character, sincere, loyal, consistent and true. A woman of exceptionally good judgment, for more than fifty years her life witness for Christ has ever been "holly reasonable" and we sincerely believe "acceptable to God." She was married in 1879 from her girlhood home in York, P. E. I., and for nearly fifty years since Mr. and Mrs. Hughes have lived in Covehead, in which place Mr. Hughes was born. Through her strong and earnest Christian influence her husband was won to Christ within two years of their marriage, and together they have since been staunch supporters and active workers in the Methodist and in the United Church. The Christian influence of this good woman's

life can only be rightly measured in heaven above. Besides her bereaved and sorrowing husband, she leaves to mourn a faithful Christian mother, three sons, William Parmenas, George Hibbert and John Franklin, all resident in Covehead, and two daughters, May Eveline, (Mrs. Leslie Bryanton, of Winsloe), and Lottie Hannah (Mrs. Herbert Vessey, of York). Mrs. Hughes also leaves three brothers, Artemas Cook, of Mount Stewart, Gorham Cook, of East Royalty, and Pope Cook, of York, and three sisters, Emily (Mrs. Wm. Sellar, of Mount Stewart), Mrs. Mary Jane McMillan, of Salt Lake City, and Minnie (Mrs. E. H. Duichman, of Denver, Colorado, Rev. E. Boothroyd, of York, and Rev. W. H. Palmer, of Winsloe, assisted in the funeral service, which was conducted in her late home in Covehead, by her pastor, Rev. Thos. A. Wilson, who spoke from Numbers 23:10, "Let me die the death of the righteous, let my last end be like his." A very large funeral procession followed the remains to the United Church cemetery in York, where they were reverently laid to rest. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Geo. T. Bearisto, Frank Howard, Jas. Dick, Herbert Vessey, J. A. Allen and Charles Auld.
