Here is the way I make dress hangers for summer dresses or waists: Take crochet thread, not too fine; insert your crochet hook through the sleeve seam on the inside and make a double chain of required length to form a loop, fastening securely. I like this better than tape, it takes but a minute to do and uses up odds and ends of thread. To make the double chain, begin with a loop around needle, take up the thread and draw through then insert hook in left side of last stitch, and repeat. This makes a good lingerie tape also.
