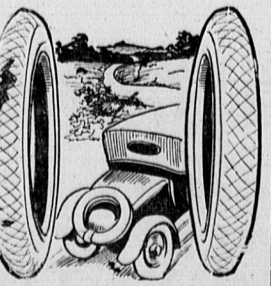

CHARLOTTETOWN MARKET.—Local dealers Friday were paying prices as follows: for staple produce: Potatoes 60 to 65c bushel, oats 70 to 80c; turnips 25 to 30c; hay \$26 to \$27 a ton, straw \$10 to \$12 a ton. The retail market was fairly well attended with prices much about the same. Butter sold cents, 62 to 65 cents, eggs 65 cents, chickens 90c, to \$1.25, fowl \$1 to \$1.10, ducks, geese several apples 8 to 12 cents, beets carrots and parsnips 15 cents a dozen, onions 7 cents a lb, pumpkins 3 cents, celery 10 to 15 cents a bunch, cabbage 5 to 10 cents a head, cauliflower, 15 cents a head.

The young mackerel have a decidedly hungry liking for caplin and schools of them are forever preying on the small fish. A live caplin on the end of a line therefore generally means a captured tinker. It is not known to what extent the full grown mackerel may be found in the harbor as only one regular mackerel grounds. The fisherman in the case was only equipped with the small outfit used for hooking the little mackerel around the wharves and the first bite received carried it away, proving undoubtedly that the big ones are there.

### COOKERY COLUMN

Cocoa Icing 4 teaspoons Cowan's Cocoa 2 cups icing sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 2 tablespoons cold water 3 tablespoons hot water Pinch of salt Method:—Mix cocoa slowly with cold water, add hot water and boil for five minutes. Add flavoring and salt. Add sugar until mixture of the right consistency is obtained. Cocoa Frosting 3 tablespoons Cowan's Cocoa 3 tablespoons coffee 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar Method:—Mix cocoa and sugar, add coffee slowly, add vanilla and beat vigorously for five minutes. This makes a very good frosting for gingerbread, especially cocoa gingerbread.
