THE SHORT COURSE

The part of the Agricultural Short Course devoted to field crops, under the management of J. A. Clark, Supt. of the Experimental Farm, is being largely attended and the students are very enthusiastic.

During the day, from 9.00-11.00 and again from 1.30-3.30, the time was devoted to the discussion of the essential and desirable qualities of grains and grasses, ground grasses and particularly forage crops. Discussion of these included plant diseases, their types and habits of growth and their consequent suitability for various purposes if they are to be used. Varieties suitable for certain localities, etc. The qualities required in seed, purity and vitality being especially emphasized.

The first day work was devoted to the discussion of the oat crop, the most important grain crop, because most grown.

Grain in the stock was placed before the students as well as packages of seed. The type of the plant diseases, character of the straw, attitudes of varieties between diseases suitable for different soils, quality of grain, diseases in percentage hull and its general influence on the crop and weight per bushel, as well as all records of production for the different varieties.

Optional classes held after the regular class period were devoted to the discussion of plant diseases.

The work on Wednesday will consist of wheat, barley and grain mixtures, while optional classes which will be held from 11.00-12.00 a. m. and from 3.30 to 5.00 p. m. will be devoted to field management, rotation of crops, etc.

On Thursday the work will cover grasses and small seeds, with the discussion of the weed seeds which are commonly found in commercial seeds.

For the remainder of the week the only classes on this subject will be optional as desired by the students.

During the following week Wednesday, Thursday and Friday will be devoted to the study of potatoes, root crops of the various kinds and corns.

For this work the services of Mr. Irving of Macdonald College at St. Anne, Quebec, a man who has had more experience than any other familiar with root crops than possibly any other man in Canada, have been secured.

Prof. Blair, Manager of the Experimental Farm at Kentville, N. S., will also be present and will take part of the work, especially with potatoes. Prof. Blair is an authority on this particular line of work and a good course will unquestionably be given.

The importance of the study of field crops cannot be over estimated. A great deal is heard about live stock as a means of keeping up the fertility of the farm, yet the keeping of live stock without the field crops is an impossibility and the argument for fertility of soil has no value except in so far as that fertility contributes to the growth of crops.

Much is to be learned regarding field crops. Careful selections and proper cultural methods are as important and give as great results as selection and management of live stock.

RECORD SHIPMENT OF GOLD

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—The largest shipment of gold ever made to South America on one steamer is said to be leaving to-day on the steamer Verdi, whose cargo includes 101 kegs, each about 18 inches long and 12 inches in diameter, filled with half eagles and double eagles. Fifteen armed guards were stationed about the ship while the cargo was being loaded. The total amount of the shipment is \$5,050,000. It was said this shipment completes a total of \$30,000,000, all in gold to South America. The present consignment goes to Buenos Ayres and Rio Janeiro.
