## Strains At Gnat— Swallows a Camel

### Premier Saunders' Religious Scruples Prevented Him From Attending to his Duty, But Not From Discus- sing Politics, on the Sabbath Day.

The manner in which Hon. M. W. W. Minister of Agriculture, stepped into the breach to welcome the British Empire Parliamentary Association delegates on the occasion of their visit to this province last summer was frankly commended by Dr. W. J. MacMillan, Conservative member for Charlottetown, during his speech at the Draft Address. Through obvious negligence on the part of the Government, when the itinerary was being arranged, the visit of these distinguished parliamentarians fell on Sunday, and apparently the religious scruples of Premier Saunders prevented him from coming to the capital to welcome them personally—a courtesy which they naturally expected to receive from the leader of the Government, and which had been accorded them in every other part of the Dominion.

The speaker was interrupted by M. McPhee (Second Queen's) who said the Premier's scruples on that occasion were a credit to him.

Mr. MacMillan: My hon. friend the Minister of Agriculture had no such scruples. He went on his own initiative to represent the Government. He had to mark a speech at the banquet tendered the visiting delegates, and may tell this House that he did it well. He acquitted himself wonderfully that night before a most difficult audience, and with a short time at his disposal. He had no religious scruples in that regard, and it is a good thing for the Province that he had; because they are no credit to any public man, those kind of scruples.

M. McPhee: Question!

Dr. MacMillan: The question is this: that there were no religious scruples in the minds of the Premier or his friends when they held a political meeting just before the last election in Summerside, on Sunday night. This is the kind of a meeting about

## M. Knight Visits Border Cities

WINDSOR, Mar. 23.—His Excellency Jean Knight, French Minister to Canada, is the guest today of border cities. This afternoon he visited the place in Sandwich where intrepid explorers from his native land first set foot on the Essex peninsula, over three centuries ago. He was met by a delegation of representative citizens and conducted through the automobile plants of the Chrysler, General Motors and Ford companies. He was accompanied by H. De Clerval, commercial attaché of the French legation at Montreal and Dr. Damien, St. Pierre of Ford, Pres. of the La Salle club, who met him at Oshawa. His Excellency paid a tribute to the memory of Marshal Foch. He considered him one of the greatest soldiers of his time and believes he would leave a deep impression on history.

## Drastic Action of The Federal Reserve Board

CHICAGO, March 23.—The Herald and Examiner tomorrow will say that a \$40,000,000 pool is being raised to offset the drastic forced calling of brokers loans by local banks, acting under pressure from the Federal Reserve Board. Ten million dollars of the pool will be available tomorrow, and the balance will be raised by Monday, the newspaper will state.

## Fox Stealing Case To Come Up Thursday

Following investigations by Detective Weeks, a party from the vicinity of Crapaud has been lodged in Prince County jail in connection with a good deal of fox stealing that has been going on. It is alleged that the prisoner and another man, whose arrest is looked for, working together, visited ranches in the neighbourhood at night with a bag in which the stolen animals were carried away to be later killed and their pelts shipped to Montreal for sale. It is stated that most of them have been sold and are so lost track of, but that three still remain in the hands of the Hudson Bay Company at Montreal. Detective Weeks has left for Montreal to obtain possession of these skins and bring them back with him for identification. If he arrives back in time the preliminary hearing of the case will take place on Thursday next at 11 a. m. at Summerside before Mr. Alexander Campbell, J. P.

## 28 BOY SCOUTS DROWNED

## DEATH OF GEN. SARRAIL

PARIS, Mar. 23.—Gen. Maurice Emmanuel Sarrail, one time "Defender of Verdun", and former high commissioner to Syria, died today at the age of 72. Gen. Sarrail, who commanded the third French army at the first battle of the Marne and who was decorated with the military medal for his courage and tenacity in holding Verdun and the heights of the Meuse, died this afternoon just three days after his chief, Marshal Foch. The General had been ill for three weeks, suffering from liver trouble.

## Rebel Troops In Counter Offensive

NEW MEXICO, Mar. 23.—Rebel troops in their counter-offensive against the govt. were at the gates of Mazatlan, on the west coast today and fighting for possession of that port was imminent. Some fighting between the 2,500 defenders and the 8,000 rebels was reported but apparently little blood has been shed.

## British Schooner Sunk by U.S. Coastguard Cutter

NEW ORLEANS, March 24.—Possibilities that the British schooner, Imalona, carried a cargo of aliens to the bottom of the Gulf of Mexico was hinted in a private opinion expressed here yesterday by United States District Attorney Edmund F. Talbot. Talbot gave it as his private opinion that the schooner was carrying either aliens or narcotics when sunk yesterday by the coastguard cutter Dexter.

## King Albert And General Pershing Among Visitors At Foch Home.

PARIS, March 23.—The whole wide world mourned with France today at the bier of Marshal Foch. King and president, general and minister of state came to pay him tribute, while thousands of the more humble crowded into the courtyard to inscribe their names in the register of those who came to do him honor.

Representing Belgium, which was the first to feel the wounds of the great war, came King Albert in person to pay tribute to the man under whom he had served in Flanders, as head of the Belgian army, in the last days of 1918. General John J. Pershing, commander-in-chief of the United States expeditionary force, also came. Premier Doumergue, Premier Poincaré and former Premier Clemenceau, "the father of victory," were there, too.

## Hankow Menaced

LONDON, Mar. 23.—The Express today says that fighting has begun on the Hunan-Kiangsi border in China between the Kwangsi opponents of the Nanking Government and the old fourth army, which is now supporting President Chiang Kai Shek. The city of Hankow was said to be menaced.

## CANADIANS TO BE DEPORTED

OTTAWA, March 23.—Canadians and other foreigners found residing in the United States without legal entry papers are to be deported and excluded from admission to the country in future under any circumstances, according to the terms of more stringent legislation approved by Congress on March 4 last, Irving T. Linnell, United States consul-general at Ottawa pointed out tonight.

## Accepts Call To Central Christian Church

A telegram has been received from Rev. W. L. Outhouse, B. A., accepting the call extended to him from the Central Christian Church of this City. Rev. Mr. Outhouse is a Canadian, but has been preaching in the United States since graduating. ## NEW TARIFF ON LUMBER

TOKIO, March 23.—Both houses of the Japanese diet today passed a new and higher tariff schedule on lumber. The schedule will effect principally pine, cedar, spruce and hemlock, most of which comes from the American northwest. It is expected to increase revenue in this country by about 6,500,000 yen (about \$2,800,000). It will affect an American-Japanese lumber trade of about \$40,000,000 annually. The bill was opposed continuously by Japanese consumers and American importers.
