was the fact that a slight breath of wind was blowing away from them. Otherwise the consequences might have been too horrible to contemplate.

Mr. Jenkins has been for a good while active and zealous in promoting the enforcement of the Scott Act in the section of the country where he resides, and found it necessary to do this because of the laxity of the authorities. His activity aroused the enmity of those engaged in the illegal rum trade, and from time to time threats were made which leave little doubt in the public mind as to the motive for the crime. Two or more persons were engaged in the dastardly deed, and drove to Mr. Jenkins' place in the midnight hours of a very dark night to carry out their purpose. The morning revealed the marks where the waggon had turned round in the road, both east and west of the farm. Apparently one or more waited in the wagon while another applied the torch. These clues, together with the threats made may help to bring the guilty parties to punishment.

Universal sympathy is felt and expressed for Mr. Jenkins and his family in the great loss they have suffered, and with it there is a sense of shame and humiliation that such a crime can be perpetrated in our peaceful, Christian country. Can it be that orderly citizens cannot lie down to sleep without fear of having their roofs burned over their heads? If so we are reduced to the conditions of anarchy and terrorism. We trust and believe that those in authority realize the conditions with which we have been suddenly confronted and will spare no pains to unearth and punish the perpetrators of this wicked and alarming crime.

A detective ought to be detailed to search the case to bottom. If the Island has not sufficient detective skill to grapple with the emergency, one should be brought from abroad. We think a reward ought to be offered by the Government for such evidence as may lead to the arrest and punishment of the guilty parties. Let it not be said that in our fair Island the incendiary's torch can be applied, and our homes and properties laid in ruins, without instant and energetic action being taken by those in authority to punish the atrocious criminals.
