PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS: The speaker speaking to you this evening on what might be termed personal matters. The question of health is one that should engage the attention of all for it is of the most importance to each and every one of us.

This hospital belongs to all the people of this County and I want to serve notice on them that it will be impossible to carry on the work of this Institution in the manner in which they would be justified in expecting it to be carried out unless we receive more contributions from those who, in the long run, are responsible for its operation.

It is almost unbelievable that with almost 40 per cent of our hospital beds being free, we are still carrying on and showing a balance on the right side of the ledger at the end of the year. It speaks volumes for the internal management for to them must be attributed most of the credit. Our fees are as low as within our revenue with a few dollars to spare.

I would again draw your attention to the fact that the hospital is a County organization and should receive the united help and support of the residents of the whole County. I feel that the Hospital is the medium that has broadened the outlook of the surgeons and physicians of this whole community.

And now in closing my remarks I solicit your sympathetic consideration of this Institution. If you have words of praise for the work it is accomplishing broadcast them so that even he who runs may heed. If you have criticism bring it to the source that will be capable of deriving benefit from it.

an even greater service than it now performs. Carping criticism creates nothing but antagonisms whereas constructive criticism will build a vehicle upon which this institution will ride to a greater service to humanity in general.

I take great pleasure in extending to you our congratulations in this, your hour of triumph. For the years since your training began you have worked hard and faithfully and, as knowledge, experience and responsibility came your way, life has taken on a power and fuller meaning. No branch of medicine has advanced more rapidly than that of nursing, and graduate nurses, just as those of other professions, may be subdivided into those who daily add to their knowledge and those who through lack of interest either remain at a standstill or lose what they have gained in their hard years of work and study.

All honour and praise, due to the nurse in helping people in times of sickness and distress, but you must bear in mind that not always will you have equipment at hand as you have had during your training days in the hospital. But this training should imbue you with the ability to work daily under all sorts of difficulties and circumstances.

Your training school not only expects you to be a better citizen yourself but also to help raise the standard of citizenship of the country. You will leave the hospital to do your part in the home. In many cases your knowledge of hygiene and preventative medicine will be called upon and in the houses of the poorer you will be able to do immeasurable good by showing how to prevent disease and how to lead healthy, wholesome lives.

Alberton Scene Of Enthusiastic Convention Rally

Messrs. Geo. M. Matthews and Henry Peters Unanimously Nominated As Conservative Candidates For First Prince.

The rousing convention on Wednesday night at the Court House, Alberton, to elect two candidates to represent the Conservative party in the 1st district at the next Provincial election was a very strong indication that the people of West Prince had every faith and confidence in the Conservative party, both federal and provincial, as the only party which can guide the country through these difficult times.

Mr. George M. Matthews, O'Leary, and Mr. Henry Peters, Duver, who were chosen to represent the district are both stalwarts of the party and very popular in the district. Mr. J. M. Ahearn, vice president of the West Prince Liberal Association, very capably presided.

Mr. Matthews was an old and faithful worker for the party and would, he was sure, do his best in the interests of Prince County electors. Mr. Russell Rogers, Coleman, president, and Mr. Robert England, Lot 7, vice president for the 2nd district, were also on the platform. Mr. Peter G. Bulger was secretary.

Others present were J. J. Chaisson, Fred Tanton, James E. Birch, James MacGrath and W. P. MacCarthy. The Court room was filled with the delegates and their supporters, 94 delegates being present out of a possible 95. Mr. Ahearn in a few opening remarks spoke very highly of the government of Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan and its wonderful achievements in obtaining an annual subsidy for the province of \$150,000 for all time, besides other important concessions.

Mr. Matthews thanked the electors for their expression of confidence. He also expressed his thanks to Dr. Lefurgey who withdrew in his favour and made the nomination unanimous. He felt sure that he would receive the utmost co-operation from the district, as the Conservatives represented a united front and had chosen their candidates from their own district.

SUMMERSIDE UNEMPLOYED ON STRIKE

The work of making a concrete wall on the buttment at the east end of Summerside harbor has been suspended, owing, according to Town Council spokesmen, to the fact that the Union men who were taken on, refused to work with men who did not belong to the Union.

The work was authorized by the Town Council at a recent meeting for the relief of unemployment under the government relief plan. The Town Council claim they cannot discriminate between Union men and non union men and that the money voted for relief must be given where most deserving. As the Union men have taken this attitude 'to' only thing to do was to close the work down.

The Council have been given to understand that many of the non union men have not the money to join the Union even if they wished to do so. In the meantime the men are idle. There are no ships in the harbor and money is scarce.—S

RESIGNATION IS RUMORED

OTTAWA, May 23—The question of whether Prime Minister R. B. Bennett will hand over the leadership of the government and party to another, or defy the orders of his medical adviser and continue in office, was apparently as far from solution today as when he returned from England a week ago. But his retirement within a matter of weeks, if not sooner, is believed to be a certainty.

It was learned definitely tonight that even those most closely associated with Mr. Bennett could not venture a guess as to what course the prime minister would follow. Mr. Bennett himself maintains an admirable silence when questioned directly as to whether or not he will attempt to carry on as government and party leader.
