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PREMIER MEIGHEN SAYS CARTIER'S EFFORTS FOR RACIAL UNITY FRUITFUL

Continued From Page Four

breeder of corruption, the enemy of him that he made his great decisions without much consultation with friends and out of the wealth of his own experience and guided by the dictates of his own conscience and intellect. Speaking of one important step in his life, he said:

"With regard to this matter I have not sought the advice of my countrymen nor of my political friends. I confess that in all important acts of my life, of my political career, I have not consulted any one."

"Possibly it is some encouragement for us now to reflect that although now the consummation of Cartier's life work is placed by universal acclaim, high and indeed among the very highest in the records of our public men, entitling him to a place in the grateful memory of his country and to a recognition such as we are now performing in various parts of the land in his own time he was subjected to assault and calumny as persistent and as bitter as was ever levelled at politicians here. He was denounced in some parts of Canada and he was denounced in his own province as secretly designing the Anglicization of his people. Both allegations are now conceded to have been flagrantly and cruelly false. A newspaper in this province once denounced him as the supporter of monopolies of the signers of the upholder of well-paid government situations, a

of justice, the champion of illegal measures, the apostle of servitude, the partisan of passive obedience, a human conscience-vendor, a Tory minister, a jobber. That pretty well covers the whole field of vilification.

Fair and Final Judgment.

"But time has done its work. Cartier himself never lived to witness, and very few men do live to witness, the fair and final judgment of his country after the smog of misrepresentation has lifted and the passions of controversy have subsided. But the favorable verdict of posterity is something of a thousand times worth what the afternoon scene of this afternoon are one of a multitude of manifestations of how sincere and how universal that favorable verdict is."

"Cartier tolled and he did not toll in vain, for friendship between English-Canadians and French-Canadians for friendship secured, based not on racial amalgamation or an impossible uniformity but on mutual confidence and respect, for the conquest of sympathy over prejudice, for the triumph of good will. Let us strive to bring to full fruition the vision of Cartier and of the fathers of Confederation. Let the aspiration of Lamartine be ours:

"Reconnaissons nous donc, fils des memes peres, et de la langue de nos aieux la-haut nous aurons."
