CANADIANS MARCH HEADED BY PIPERS

LONDON, Oct. 17.—Throughout the night of Thursday and all Friday, the transports at Devonshire docks, at Plymouth, were busy disembarking the members of the Canadian contingent, who immediately entrained for Salisbury, where their camps were all in readiness. The first detachment to march through the streets were the Strathcona Horse. Headed by their pipers, they made their way to their trains amid the enthusiastic shouts of large crowds of Plymouth citizens. For the sake of convenience the majority of the troops entrained in the dock yards and merely passed through Mill Bay station at Plymouth. The station was closed and guarded by the police, but throngs of interested spectators stood outside the railings and cheered every glimpse of the trains with their khaki-clad Canadian soldier.

The Herald correspondent was probably the only newspaper man who actually boarded the ships, as the dock yards were closely watched and no one was allowed to enter without a special permit. One of these your correspondent managed to secure. It was learned that the voyage had been accomplished in comfort and in safety. The health of the men was excellent and there were no serious illnesses and very little seasickness. The arrangements made by the Admiralty for the convey of the contingent were most successful. The details furnished by my informant are not for publication, but the absence of fog and storm rendered a satisfactory though necessarily slow voyage. The health of the horses was satisfactory, the mortality being only two per cent.

Throughout Thursday the troops were kept aboard the transports, leave to go ashore being strictly refused to officers as well as men. This was felt to be a hardship, particularly by natives of the old country, many of whom counted upon finding familiar friends waiting to see them as Cornwall and Devonshire are the native counties of a large percentage of the military men. The Princess Pat's pets were greatly disappointed at the cancellation of their earlier departure, having hoped, as one man said, to be on the firing line ere this.

All the leading newspapers, besides reporting the arrival of the Canadians with full details, devote considerable editorial space to calling attention to the landing of the first overseas contingent. AMERICA MUST KNOW TRUTH OF HER SITUATION

New York Herald Heartily Endorses Representative Gardner's Resolution.

MUST BE READY FOR WAR.

At Present She Could Make No Showing Against Any Big Power.

The New York Herald under the caption, "Americans Should Know the Truth," says editorially:—

Representative Gardner's characterization of the German cause as "unholy" and "a menace to the principle of democracy," will very likely get on the nerves of those super-neutrals to whom anything other than praise for the Kaiser seems a breach of the spirit of neutrality. However, this is a country where freedom of speech is not denied, even to minority members of Congress. With such controversy as may follow his "calling a spade a spade," as he sees it, the American people have small concern, but they should be vitally concerned to his resolution providing for an investigation into the state of this country's military preparedness. When militarism is rampant no country is safe. Every intelligent man who has investigated for himself knows that the United States is totally unprepared for a defensive war waged against it by any real power. Every other Government knows this. Only the American people, in the mass are ignorant of the fact. It will be well for the country to have a commission of the kind suggested by Representative Gardner to make its own investigation and tell the people the truth.

AMERICA'S NEUTRAL RIGHTS.

The World discusses America's neutral rights as follows:—

The reason why the people of the United States are supplying Great Britain and France with arms, ammunition and food stuffs is not to be found in any disregard of the neutrality laws. It is explained by the fact that Germany and Austria have practically abandoned the seas.

As some of our German friends in the United States have protested against a traffic that is perfectly lawful, the State Department at Washington has found it necessary once more to explain the situation. There is nothing in the law of nations, in our treaties or in our laws that forbid citizens of the United States selling anything that they produce or possess to belligerent nations.

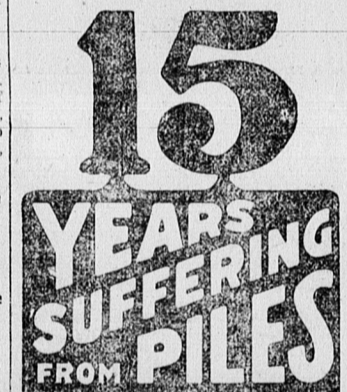

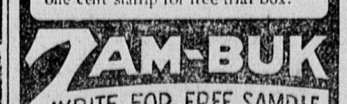
