#### INTEREST MAINTAINED IN JUDGING

Visiting Hockey Players Express Keen Interest On Inspection.

Foggy weather and a drizzle of rain made conditions far from ideal for the second day's judging at the Silver Fox Show, but Judge Calbeck carried on under these difficulties with his usual patience and skill, going over every animal with even more thoroughness because of the unfavorable conditions. There was a good attendance in the morning, and the afternoon's was a record breaker, every seat being occupied and every vantage point being taken up by a spectator. Interest was maintained at high level throughout the day, and the successful winners were usually greeted with applause.

The highlight of the afternoon was the visit of Art Ross and Frank Patrick, Manager and coach of the Boston Bruins, Sylvia Mantha and L. Dugald, Managers of Les Canadiens. They were accompanied by quite a number of the players and all were introduced to the audience and three cheers and a tiger were given them. From the Fox Show building they went to Government House where they were cordially received by His Honor Governor DeBolis. In conversation with Charlottetonians who accompanied them to and from the Fox Show, they expressed their keen interest in what they saw and their pleasure at the kindness shown them since coming to this province.

Judging was a little late in starting as quite a number of the competitors were taking a little extra nap after the banquet of the night before, which was such an enjoyable one, but it was under way at 9.30 to a good start with the medium silvers.

The class first on the table was MEDIUM SILVER YEARLING MALES. It was a large entry list and a difficult one to place for most of the positions, but there was no question as to Ira Carr being first. He exhibited a magnificent fox and had a well defined neck. Right at his heels was Walter Gregor, followed by Gordon McMillan, W. B. McArthur and H. G. Muttart, all with excellent entries. In fact every fox on the table was a good one.

MEDIUM SILVER ADULT FEMALES. This was the largest class that has appeared up to that time on the show table, and was another excellent one. S. R. Johnston, exhibiting a beautiful female, was first, closely followed by A. L. Rogers, Kensington, with Hillview Miss 3H, Gordon McMillan third with Dalehurst 66L, John Woodside fourth and John R. Allen & Sons fifth. A very fine class of adult females, one of the best seen here we would say.

MEDIUM SILVER YEARLING FEMALES. This was a large class, in fact all the classes yesterday were large. First prize was won by Robert Baker with Oyster Shore 10M, a beautiful clear, silky female, finished perfectly. Second was won by A. L. Rogers with Hillview Miss 92M, making two seconds for Mr. Rogers in two consecutive classes. W. W. Brown was third followed by F. G. Kennedy, and Hillard Muttart, Summerside.

#### Occupation Of Makale Claimed By The Italians

Repulse Of Invaders Alleged By Ethiopians However. Natives Mass South Of City For Battle.

(By Andree Berding, Associated Press Foreign Staff) (Copyright 1935 By The Associated Press) (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) AT THE FRONT WITH THE ITALIAN NORTHERN ARMIES, Nov. 6.—Natives of this occupied territory told the Associated Press correspondent tonight that vast armies of Ethiopians—"so many they cannot be counted"—were massing for pitched battle at Amba Alji (40 miles south of Makale). The armies, these native informants told me, are under the leadership of Ras Kassa and Ethiopian Minister of War Mulugueta. Italian forces cleaning up the territory around Haulien, meanwhile, fought a vigorous engagement with Ethiopians which was ended when Italian Askaris, armed with sabres and bayonets, charged the hostile tribesmen.

#### Many Casualties Reported

Many Ethiopians were reported killed as they fled the hand-to-hand encounter. Two Italian officers were wounded, two native soldiers were killed and 10 Askaris wounded.

West of Askam, regular Fascist troops occupied the town of Selacica. Italy's regiments, due to resume their advance on Makale tomorrow, will capture "a deserted city," the natives also contended. Italian scouts previously had reported the actual entrance into Makale of an advance patrol from the forces of Ras Gugsu, Emperor Haile Selassie's traitorous son-in-law. But the natives said only those natives adhering to Gugsu would be found when the main forces reached that objective city. #### FOUR DROWNED WHEN BOAT CAPSIZES

New Brunswick Fishermen Seeking To Salvage Large Box Are Victims.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CARAQUET, N. B., Nov. 6.—News of the drowning of four fishermen last evening at Lower Caraqueet was received here tonight. Two men survived after a dory containing the six capsize a short distance from this fishing village. The dead: Nazade Debosthillier, 45; his son, Alphonse, 17; Maxime Paulin, 38, and Martin T. Paulin, 20. Philias Doucet and Abbe Legere managed to cling to the overturned boat until they were rescued by other French Canadian fishermen from the Gloucester county village. An attempt to salvage a large box led to the quadruple tragedy in rough waters churning from the Baie de Chaleur to the Gulf of St. Lawrence. All four bodies were recovered. Dr. F. X. Comeau, coroner, decided an inquest would be unnecessary. Grimly ironic, the drownings occurred as the fishermen were ending a season's operations, having until that time survived the perils of their hazardous occupation. The elder Debosthillier, a well known figure among Gloucester County fishermen, and the five other men were hauling fish from a slip when they noticed the big box floating seaward. Crowding into a dory, the six rowed out in pursuit of the drifting object. Suddenly the little craft overturned beneath a wave, spilling all the occupants into the cold bay waters. The four victims, weighted by their clothing, disappeared in a matter of seconds. The elder Debosthillier and Paulin are survived by wives and large families.

#### REICH TO CURB PROFITEERING

Sympathetic Co-operation With League Indicated.

(By Joseph E. Sharkey, Associated Press Foreign Staff) GENEVA, Nov. 6.—Germany told the League of Nations tonight she will permit no war profiteering whatsoever in the Reich. An official League communique disclosed Adolf Hitler's decision to stamp out all speculation in products which Germany is convinced are destined for either Italy or Ethiopia. League officials and many delegates interpreted the Reich's action as meaning the non-member Reich will do nothing or permit nothing to balk Geneva's efforts to bring quick termination of the African campaign. Meanwhile the committee of 18 approved the proposal of Dr. Walter Riddell, Canadian delegate, that petroleum, coal and iron and their derivatives be added to the list of "key products" which League members will not export to Italy. It recommended that inclusion of these products go into effect "as soon as necessary conditions for effectiveness of such extension have been achieved."

#### HEPBURN WILL RECONSIDER IS OTTAWA VIEW

Resignation Report Due To Grievance With Mackenzie King?

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.—Despite the clear, definite terms in which Premier Mitchell F. Heppburn of Ontario made known today his intention to quit politics at the end of the approaching legislative session, federal Liberalism refuses to believe that his statement is final. "THREAT, NOT PROMISE?" "A threat, not a promise," was the cynical summation-up with which members of the high command of Mackenzie King Liberalism disposed of Mr. Heppburn's announcement. Its purpose, federal Liberals contended, is two-fold, viz.: primarily, to assert his grievance against the federal Liberal Prime Minister, for being ignored in the formation of the recent Liberal cabinet and for having his advice against wholesale dismissals in the federal civil service flatly rejected. Secondly, to bring to heel refractory members of his own cabinet in connection with his pledges made in his election campaign, almost two years ago now, to the separate school supporters of Ontario.

#### Seek Crews Of Missing Ships

GIMLI, Man., Nov. 6.—Search parties started by dog team today along the west shore of Lake Winnipeg in an effort to locate and rescue crews of two missing fishing steamers, the Lu-Berg and Luana. Unreported for 14 days, both boats were believed held fast in the lake somewhere by the early freeze-up. The dog team search parties were decided upon after a conference between representatives of the fishing companies who own the boats and the Manitoba Department of Natural Resources.

#### Scottish Bride Is Royally Welcomed By Londoners

Duke And Duchess Of Gloucester Tendered Enthusiastic Ovation Following Wedding.

(By Thomas T. Champion, Canadian Press Staff Writer) (C. P. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Nov. 7.—London took the Duke of Gloucester's lovely Scottish bride to its heart today. Thousands, assembled before dawn, offered Lady Alice Scott a tumultuous welcome on the drive to Buckingham Palace from her home in Grosvenor Place. Looking radiantly happy she smiled and waved repeatedly. Beside her was her brother, the Duke of Buccleuch, who gave her away. Following the wedding ceremony the scene before the palace was reminiscent of war years. The King and Queen, the Duke and his bride, the Princess Royal and other royals appeared on the balcony evoking a hurricane of enthusiasm. The big gates of the palace were fairly stormed, the crowds breaking police lines and even disturbing the guardsmen and sentinels within the quadrangle.

#### WILL REOPEN TRADE TALKS

King To Resume Negotiations Begun By Late Government.

MONTREAL, Nov. 6.—Prime Minister Mackenzie King, travelling toward Washington tonight on the first leg of a journey that will combine business with a period of rest and relaxation in the south, has kept his own counsel as to the extent to which he will take up important matters outstanding between Canada and the United States. But all indications point to one prime purpose with which his visit on Friday next to the White House may be associated. That is the early negotiation of a reciprocal trade agreement, started some time ago by the late government. With three departmental trade experts already in Washington since the first of this week, the same delegation that opened the trade negotiations under the government of Prime Minister Bennett, and Dr. O. D. Skelton, Under Secretary of State for External Affairs, accompanying Mr. King, it was assumed that the hope of the government is for the early completion of a trade agreement. Mr. King said, during the campaign, that he could secure an agreement before the end of the year. Undoubtedly Mr. King and President Roosevelt will take up in a general way other matters of interest to both countries during the former's overnight visit at the White House. Trade with Russia, sanctions against Italy, and the larger picture of trade between Canada and United States when the government's tariff program is more definitely settled, are expected to be subjects touched upon informally.

#### DEMOCRATS MAKE GAIN

Kentucky Swings In Support Of Present Government.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The Democratic party held an early and increasing lead in Kentucky gubernatorial ballot-counting tonight while party leaders disputed the true significance of Republican triumphs in the Eastern States. Despite the defection of Kentucky's Democratic Governor, Ruby Laffoon, the present Lieutenant-Governor, A. B. Chandler, started off with a lead over his Republican opponent, Judge King Swann. From Tuesday's hazy balloting growing returns showed Democratic gains compared with the voting of two years ago. With Chandler, a proposal that Kentucky repeal its prohibition amendment also held an early lead, as did a proposal to establish state-maintained old age pensions. Safely in control of the New York and New Jersey state assemblies in Philadelphia and a Superior Court Judge for Pennsylvania. Republican leaders claimed voters in those states had repudiated the new deal.
