A WORSE TIE-UP FOR RAILWAYS IN U. S. IN PROSPECT.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Industrial and railway centres of the east, unaffected by the fuel administration's weekly headless Monday order, were forced to slow down their important war operations today by a snow fall which in some sections was heavy.

Worst Tie-Up Likely. Indications were that the snow would continue Tuesday from the lake region eastward and the worst tie-up of railway traffic of the winter was in prospect should the weather bureau's predictions be fulfilled.

Low temperatures continue east of the Rocky Mountains. There will be little change today or tomorrow from the Ohio Valley eastward, but through the south a cold wave is forecast, reaching the coast as far south as northern Florida, by Tuesday.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 1.—Due to the biggest snow storm of the winter the trip on the Pennsylvania railroad is said by officials of the company to be the worst from any cause in years.

Reports reached headquarters here that six of the Pennsylvania's fast through trains were stalled in the mountains. Four are indefinitely held up at Altoona.

Early in the day Pennsylvania officials decided to take no chances and several trains both ways between New York and Philadelphia were cancelled. Frozen switches and low lying fog and smoke made traffic dangerous as signals could not be observed.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Coal movements were checked, freight congestion intensified and street traffic badly hampered by a snow storm which struck New York this morning and continued throughout the day.

Good Word For Railway

Sir.—Well I arrived in New York after a tedious journey. Lots of snow and zero temperature here.

You have often heard severe criticism about "The Island" Railway. Is it as bad as people like to say it is? Here are the facts as experienced on this trip.

Leaving Charlottetown Wednesday Jan. 23rd at 6 a. m. we arrived at Borden at 8.30 a. m. having made a great number of stops at the different stations and sidings en route.

After transferring mails and express goods the commodious Car Ferry steamer made the run through the ice in one hour, and so we arrived at Tormentine. Without delays we reached Sackville and made connections with the Ocean Limited for Montreal.

Thus far on our way all service was on time. The Ocean Limited was due in Montreal Thursday morning at 9 a. m. but we had our delays and so the train was five hours late.

Again leaving Montreal Friday night at 8.05 p. m. over the New York Rutland road which was due to arrive in New York at 7.25 a. m. Saturday, but this train, which is a good one, was also four hours late. Causes all due to abnormal conditions of transportation.

Now during this trip one cannot but be impressed with the fact that the "Join Monroe" Express from Charlottetown to Borden was the only one that was on time; whether this was due to the fact that the managing editors of the Guardian, Patriot and Examiner were with us I cannot say.

The same promptness with the dispatching of express parcels on "The Island" are likewise true, the delays are after you get further along on your journey.

Summing it all up, it looks that "The Island" railway is as well run and capably managed as other roads and we should appreciate the men who are directing affairs, and also the men who are operating the road so satisfactorily under present day conditions.
