

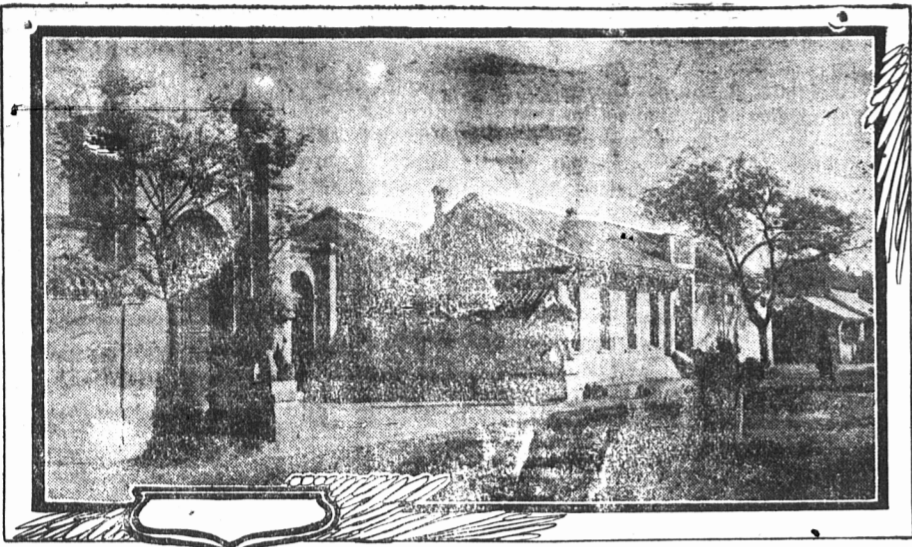

RUSSIAN MINISTER IS MAKING TROUBLE AT PEKIN

Wants War to Force China's Hand—Novosti Talks Lightly of War but Russians are Less Cheerful—M. Hanotaux Fears China will Intervene.

LONDON HAS LITTLE NEWS

LONDON, March 29.—(Special)—There was no news of much consequence from the far east today.

LA-SAR INCITING TROUBLE.

A cable from Peking states that the Russian Minister there, Paul Lassar, is accused of systematically endeavouring to bring about war between Russia and China.

NAGGING THE FOREIGN OFFICE.

He is wearing out the patience of the Chinese by insolent nagging of the Foreign Office with petty complaints.

TO PARALYSE CHINA.

It is said Lassar believes if Russia were at liberty to deal China a crushing blow in the vicinity of the Great Wall and make a quick attack on the capital it could immediately put an end to all danger of China joining Japan.

RUSSIAN NEWSPAPER OPINION.

St. Petersburg, March 29.—(Special)—

Forecasting the result of the war the Novosti declares there is no more doubt as to who will eventually win than there was at the commencement of the Greco-Turkish, Spanish-American or Boer wars.

ONLY A NOMINAL WAR.

The paper says that for Japan the war is life or death struggle, while for Russia it is only a nominal war.

RUSSIA LESS CHEERFUL.

Paris, March 29.—(Special)—A St. Petersburg despatch says Russians are less optimistic concerning the war in anticipation of approaching events of a decisive character.

A FRENCH STATESMAN'S VIEW.

M. Hanotaux in a newspaper article published today acknowledges his fear of Chinese intervention in the eastern war.

The events of 1900, he thinks, constitute a warning of which European statesmen should be mindful. He advises France to be ready.

TWO B.C. ACTS ARE DISALLOWED

They were Against Asiatic Labor—Marconi Reported Ill—Canadian Wheat Samples for England.

TWO ACTS DISALLOWED.

OTTAWA, March 29.—(Special)—The Government has disallowed two more bills passed by the British Columbia Legislature during the session of 1903.

One is an act to regulate immigration into British Columbia and the other an act to further amend the coal mines regulation act.

AGAINST ASIATIC LABOR.

Both bills were directed against the employment of Japanese and Chinese. These bills were re-enacted at the last meeting of the Legislature and no doubt will be disallowed again.

WANTS GOOD WHEAT SAMPLES.

At a meeting of the Agricultural Committee today Dr. Saunders stated that any sample of Canadian wheat sent for trial in England should show a high percentage of gluten compared with English wheats.

HALIFAX PRODUCE MARKET.

The market has been rather inactive with not much change in prices of anything but eggs and potatoes since last week. Eggs under the influence of increased receipts, are getting cheaper daily. They are not overly plentiful here, but will soon be coming in in large quantities from P. E. I. They are offered there at 18 cents. The leading Island dealer writes: "We are now getting the new crop of eggs in, and can fill orders for limited quantities. We quote 18 cents here, and look for still lower prices soon, depending on the weather."

They are quoted here at 19 with a probability of being lower before Monday. Butter remains about the same. Cheese is unchanged also with stocks a good deal reduced and some being received from Montreal. Charlottetown is asking 1 1/2 delivered here.

Potatoes are pretty scarce. They are now quoted at 35 cents for P. E. Island and \$1.75 per barrel for New Brunswick a fair quantity of the latter being exported. P. E. I. stock will be scarce until the roads get opened there. There is at present too much frost at night to handle them conveniently and without risk. This, and the fact that a good many have been exported, has made them on the scarce side here.

Turnips are a little higher now, being quoted at \$1.00 for 150 lbs. bags. A few carrots have made their appearance at the extraordinary price of \$2.00 to \$2.50 per barrel. —Halifax Herald, 28th.

TORONTO, March 29.—(Special)—The House adjourned at 8:30 a.m. today after an all-night session in which the Government supporters were forced to talk against time waiting for trains to bring enough Liberals to vote down a resolution that no subsidy shall hereafter be granted to any railway except upon the express condition that passenger rates shall not exceed two cents per mile.
