The Markets

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 15.—Canad-
ian egg markets continue very firm
with some advance in prices report-
ed.

Toronto: This egg market is again
firm. Dealers are quoting country
shippers extras 43 to 44 cents; firsts
40 to 41 cents; pullet extras 34 to 35
cents; seconds, 32 cents, delivered.
Price to retailers are extras 48 to 49
cents; firsts 44 to 45 cents; pullet ex-
tras 40 cents; seconds, 36 cents. Job-
bing prices are 1 cent lower.

St. John: This egg market is firm
and higher. The demand is good es-
pecially for firsts and there have been
heavy importations from P. E. I. to
meet the local demand. Dealers are
quoting country shippers extras 35 to
38 cents; firsts 31 to 33 cents; sec-
onds 26 to 28 cents.

Halifax: There is no change in the
situation on this egg market. Eggs
are scarce but prices are unchanged.
Dealers are quoting country shippers
extras 37 to 38 cents; firsts 30 to 32
cents; seconds 25 to 26 cents.

Vancouver: Prices to producers
have advanced here today. Dealers
are now paying extras 33 cents; firsts
29 cents pullet extras 27 cts. Prices to
retailers are extras 40 cts. firsts 37
cents; seconds 34 cents.
