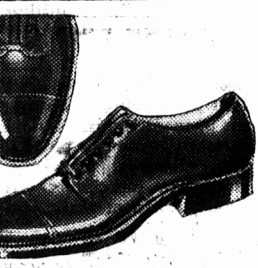

Joe Dundee Knocked Out by Jack Thompson, Negro Boxer

CHICAGO, August 31.—A sensational negro warrior from San Francisco, Young Jack Thompson, knocked out Joe Dundee, welterweight champion of the world, in the second round of a scheduled ten-round battle, in the White Sox ball park tonight. Dundee, knocked down twice, was reeling and helpless, his back to the ropes, when Referee Eddie Purdy humanely stepped in and stopped the uneven battle.

Thompson was credited with a technical knockout. He did not win the world's welterweight title, however, as Dundee, possibly fearing defeat, forced the San Francisco negro to weigh a pound above the welterweight limit. After a fairly even first round, Dundee's statement in an address here on the provisions of the White bill, which he said would enable American vessels to successfully compete for freight traffic.
