### Feared Islander Drowned in Gulf

(From Vancouver Exc., March 9th) Provincial police constables are searching coastal waters and beaches in the vicinity of Thormanby Island for K.M. Stewart, lumber operator who is believed drowned. He has not been seen since he departed from Buccaneer Bay in a small skiff for assistance for his three companions who were aboard the gas boat White Rock, the engine of which had broken down and which was helpless in a tempestuous sea.

Constable Kearns of Pender Harbor is conducting a vigilant search for the missing man. All hope of finding him alive has been abandoned.

Mr. Stewart was a native of Prince Edward Island, a son of the late Mr. Thomas Stewart of New Argyle. As a young man he left his home town and came to the Coast in 1895.

Settling in Fort Angeles he became manager of one of the leading lumber mills of that city, which position he held for twenty-five years.

Three years ago Mr. Stewart came to Vancouver. He had been connected with logging interests since his residence in this city.

He is survived by one brother in Boston, Mass. K. M. Stewart, aged 65, a logger residing at the Niagara Hotel, is believed to have been lost in seeking assistance for his three companions who were adrift in a launch in a storm off Thormanby Island Tuesday afternoon, according to word received by the provincial police. After drifting from Welcome Pass to Marble Bay, the disabled gasboat with A. H. Dennistoun, William A. Beaton and J. Lamb were rescued by the tug Dominion.

### Boat Developed Engine Trouble

The party of four started off Sunday night in a motorboat White Rock to look at some timber on Cortez Island. All went well until the boat was off Welcome Pass, according to a report made by Mr. Dennistoun to the police. Here engine trouble developed. There were evidence of an approaching storm, and Stewart volunteered to row to Buccaneer Bay, Thormanby Island to seek something necessary to repair the engine.

### Lost Sight of in High Seas

Not finding anything suitable at the summer settlement, Stewart waved to his companions on the drifting launch indicating that he would attempt to row to another part of the island. The seas were running high at the time. It was 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon and Stewart had been on the island for two hours.

The White Rock meantime was drifting towards Malaspina Straits between Texada Island and the mainland.

When Stewart did not return and they lost sight of him in the high seas they gave him up for lost.

In the pelting rain and lashing wind the helpless boat was driven into the straits and travelled approximately thirty miles from Welcome Pass before the tug Dominion sighted her Wednesday off Van Anda and rescued the three men.

"Mr. Stewart may have been able to reach shore," Mr. Dennistoun told The Province, "but I am afraid that his small boat would be swamped in the heavy seas which rose after he left the launch."

### Wall St. Tricksters Forever on Search For New Victims

NEW YORK, March 20.—The financial underworld which fringes Wall Street steadily hits upon new methods to keep up with the times and ahead of the law. Its jargon is elastic, impromptu and bizarre.

For example, swindlers who fleece the public through sales of fake stocks work by telephone in what is called a boiler room. Telephone salesmen are said to "hook the suckers." Dynamiters, co-called, "build up" the victims and hoodwink them into switching from standard securities first held out as bait to attract investment to worthless stocks which the conspirators are in business to unload.

Some will find telephone calls possible, "good luck," gone the bunco man who struck up acquaintance with prosperous visitors from the interior at metropolitan railway depots in the '90s. The get-rich-quick man of today has imagination. Avoiding the mails as much as possible, he strikes over the telephone and telegraph, often to bring down quarry as much as several states away.

These swindlers operate from offices that usually are obscure, sometimes merely desk room, so customers will find telephone calls hard to trace. In the larger plans there often is a battery of calls as eight telephones. This is the boiler room, the term being derived from the practice of creating an atmosphere of bustling activity to impress investors suckers who cannot be kept away.

The bustle is not wholly fictitious, the Better Business Bureau investigators have found. Hour in, hour out, salesmen with good voices canvass by wire a list of names selected either from a secret "sucker's list" or the telephone directory. They hook their man by offering to let him buy some active standard stock guaranteed to advance, on a partial-payment plan. He can sell out at the rise and take a profit perhaps equal to as much as he has paid in. The more is duly received, but the stock is never bought.

When the stock goes up and the customer has a substantial paper profit to his credit the dynamiter steps in to give him high-pressure treatment.

"Dully" comes a smooth, congratulatory voice over the telephone. "Didn't we tell you? See what a concern like ours can do for you?"

The dynamiter, if he is a good one, persuades the happy plunger to switch to another stock, equally guaranteed, which will bring far higher profits. This will take a slight additional investment, of course. "It takes money to make money, but you know by this time you can trust us!"

The new stock, the luckless customer finds, is worthless. If he threatens to make trouble he sometimes gets an adjustment. Not often. Usually salesmen and dynamiters quietly pack the boiler room in a suitcase and fade away—to bob up elsewhere tomorrow.

An attorney in Toledo, Ohio, was reached by long distance telephone from Philadelphia and New York. He placed \$515 on a curb stock here, and won. He was persuaded to switch to a worthless mining stock, and agreed to send \$2,500 more. Postal inspectors nabbed one of the swindlers at a telegraph

### British Naval Estimates Passed By House

(Associated Press)

LONDON, March 20.—The House of Commons has approved the naval estimates for 1925. These include funds for completion of the great naval base at Singapore, work on which was halted when the Socialist Government of Ramsay MacDonald came into power. The vote was 221 to 77.

MacDonald spoke vehemently against the programme outlined by William C. Bridgeman, First Lord of the Admiralty, but he could not carry the House with him.

### To Use Seized Dock.

Bridgeman announced that the Government planned to utilize the drydock seized from Germany, and now at Portsmouth, for Singapore. It will be altered to accommodate the largest battleship. The cost of alteration and installation will amount to \$3,750,000, of which \$1,250,000 already has been appropriated.

British shipyards will complete eight cruisers two submarines and two battleships before the end of 1926, Bridgeman said. Five of the cruisers were authorized by the late Socialist Government. The battleships are the Rodney and the Nelson.

### Strange Diversity Of Family Beliefs

LONDON, Mar. 22.—In connection with the death announced here today of Edward Lyulph Stanley, Lord Sheffield, it is remarked by those interested in unusual situations that the family of Lord Sheffield had a remarkable diversity of religious belief.

The late peer, whom he succeeded in the title in 1903, was Mohammedan, and another brother, the Hon. Right Rev. Monsignor Algernon Charles Stanley, is the Roman Catholic Bishop of Edmonton. Lord Sheffield's daughter, Hon. Venetia Stanley, adopted Jewry, on becoming engaged to E. S. Montagu, whom she married in 1915. She is now a widow, her husband having died on November 15th last. A sister is a devoted social and unsectarian worker in that curious quarter of London called Soho.

The late Lord Sheffield wrote that curious quarter in support of those overseas statesmen, who repudiated

ed the settled form of Imperial federation. He considered General Jan Christian Smuts, former Premier of South Africa, as by far the ablest of the overseas statesmen, and quoted his views on Imperial federation with evident relish.

### Another Earthquake Recorded Saturday

(Canadian Press) QUEBEC, March 22.—An earthquake was recorded in many parts of Eastern Canada this morning with its epicentre believed to be located in the vicinity of Baie St. Paul, this province. No damage has been reported, but the shock was very noticeable in Quebec where houses shook and people were in some cases hysterical from fear. Communications by wire were shut off from the centres where the shock was strongest and nothing could be learned this (Saturday) afternoon as to the extent of the disturbance there.
