Re-stock Lakes in New Brunswick

Stocking of lakes in the vicinity of the Algonquin Hotel, St. Andrews, N.B., with salmon and trout has been going on since this year, judging by reports coming in to the General Tourist Agent's office, Canadian Pacific Railway, recently. According to latest advices, 75,000 land-locked salmon have been placed in Chamcook Lake, 25,000 trout fry in Lineburner Lake, 10,000 trout fry each in Steens and Bills Lakes and 100 trout fry each in Mud, Keers, Creasy and Welsh lakes, all within a distance of from four to nine miles of the hotel. In addition to the above, Chamcook Lake was stocked with 100,000 Atlantic Salmon Fry in 1925. Most of these lakes are accessible by automobile from the hotel, the farthest a fisherman would have to walk would be a mile from the car. Recently a party of seven fisherman who went to Lake Utopia nearby, took between noon day and noon Sunday a catch of 100 trout using live smelts. The big time for fly fishing is in July and August and there is small chance of exhaustion of lakes in this neighborhood having regard to the re-stocking that is being done so generously in this region.

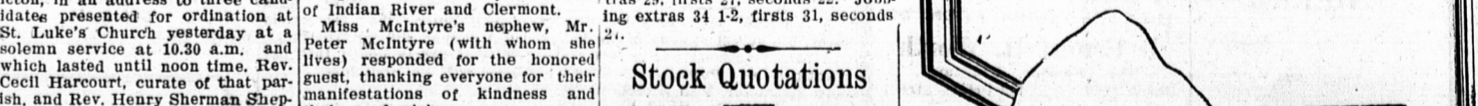

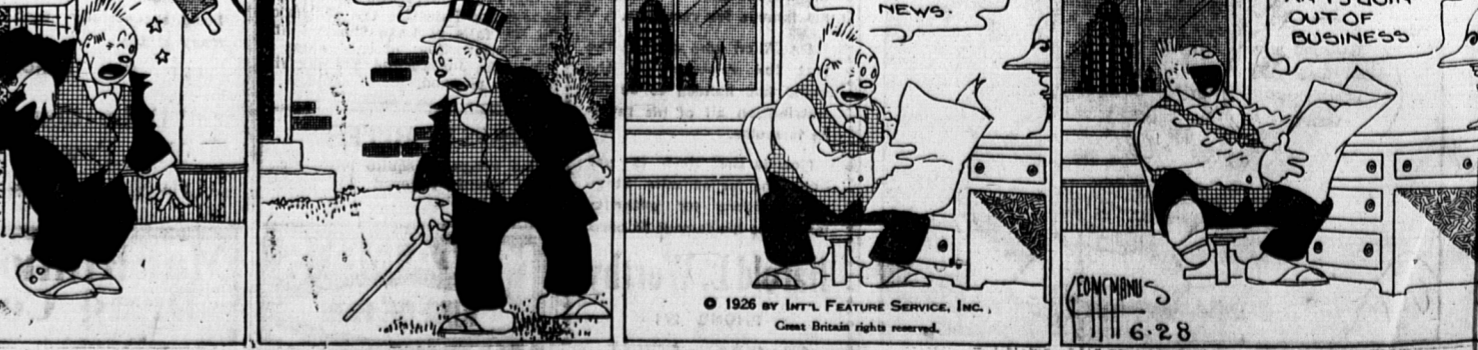
