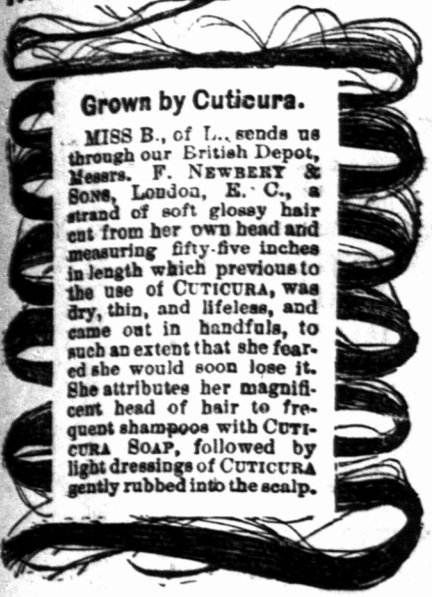


The U. S. Pension Roll.

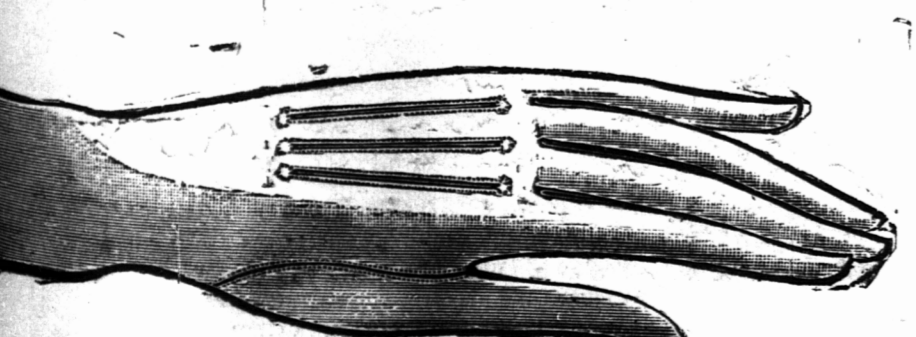

The steamer Elliot was due last night from Sydney with a cargo of the genuine old mine Sydney coal for D. McMillan See ad.

The Elliot.—Shippers of live stock and other produce for the two Sydneys will note sailing of S S Elliot on Saturday evening, 11th inst.

The Parrsboro, Leader says Mrs. Lane, of Parrsboro has received a cable from her husband, Chaplain Lane, announcing his departure from Cape Town on July 31st for home. He will come by the troopship Canada.

A small schooner, the North Star, coal laden for this port, ran ashore during Wednesday night on Governor's Island. The schooner is commanded by Captain John Ellsworth, jr. Her cargo will have to be taken out before she can be floated off. The crew are all safe.

The firm of George Carter & Co., have very generously presented a handsome dressing-case to the C. A. A. A., Electric Light Sports, to be competed for on the evening of the 14th. On Friday morning, 3rd August, Souris lost one of its most respected citizens by the death of Mr. John Morrow, merchant. Mr. Morrow had been ill for some considerable time, but hopes were entertained of his recovery, till within a few weeks ago. He leaves behind a wife and two children to mourn his loss, and for whom much sympathy is felt. On Saturday, one of the largest funeral processions ever seen in Souris, preceded by his brother Masons and Foresters, followed his remains to Souris West where he was buried with Masonic ritual. Mr. Morrow was a man of a quiet, kind, and obliging disposition, and died trusting in the merits of his Redeemer.

In referring to the benefit of the tourist trade a Halifax exchange says: The tourist trade is now pretty well under way, although the number of tourists at this time is not so large as at the same time last year. A Halifax merchant remarked to us that one day a short time ago he had the value of the tourist trade drawn to his attention in a particularly striking manner. It was a day which seemed to be rather dull in many respects and he remarked to his partner when it was nearly through that business was singularly slack; but when he came to total up the sales he found that they were exceptionally large. The purchasers were not many, but they were almost entirely tourists who bought large bills of goods and paid the cash for them. "Had it not been for these tourists," he said "the store might as well have been closed all day." It is probably the same throughout the country that the people native in the respective parts are not buying to any great extent simply because this is not their buying time. For this reason the tourist trade is particularly valuable as it helps to keep things moving all the time, and conduces to prosperity. The chief things that tourists are buying now are linens, real laces, golf capes, woolen goods, and kid gloves.

Says the Edmonton Bulletin: John Everett Ball, whose death at Koonstad, of enteric fever on July 28th has been reported, was a son of John Ball, contractor, of Edmonton. The deceased joined the Mounted Rifles at Edmonton as a private, and left for South Africa on Jan. 2nd. Several letters were received from him by his parents—all of a cheerful character. The last letter was dated Bloemfontein, where he was then employed in the hospital. He was a strong, healthy, well-doing young man, 23 years of age. He was born in Prince Edward Island. His parents removed from there to the United States and came to Edmonton some five years ago. They located land in East Edmonton, where the deceased had a farm. He also worked at the building trade with his father and brothers. The character of the deceased was typical of the large majority of the men composing the Mounted rifles, strongly healthy, courageous, of high principle and good understanding—they were of the best blood of Canada—and there is none better in the world as their work have shown. The sacrifice of such valuable and promising lives is what gives the true measure of Canadian manhood and Canadian loyalty.

The week ending August 4th was a record breaker in the history of travel to Yarmouth. A total of 3,316 passengers were landed, an average of over 550 per day. Of these the D. A. R. boats in six trips, landed 1,823 and the Y. S. S. Co. in four landed 1,493.

An exceedingly painful accident where-by he lost his left leg happened to Capt. Thomas Patten, of the schooner Henry G. Ives, Monday at noon when entering the St. Peters canal. The schooner was coming in from the bay with quite a headway, and the Captain's leg got entangled in the mooring rope. The headway was so great that instantly the leg was broken and the rope served the limb above the ankle. Capt. Patten showed great courage and patience waiting for several hours for the arrival of a doctor, both doctors being out of town. Tuesday morning the leg was amputated above the ankle by Doctors Bissett and McDonald, and Dr. Fixott, of Arichat. The schooner was lumber laden bound from Summerside, P. E. I. to Sydney, the cargo consigned to, Schurman, Lefurgey, Clark & Co. Capt. Patten is a native of Merigonish, Pictou Co.

SOME days ago THE GUARDIAN's attention was called to the fact of the lack of drinking fountains in the city. Recently thirty odd public fountains were installed in the city of Boston. In referring to the day on which the fountains began to flow the Boston Traveller says: None who witnessed the scenes at any of the fountains could fail to be thankful for the public service. The great boon was accepted with avidity, and hundreds of thirsty men, women and children were refreshed at the fountains to the better endurance of a wearying August day. For the rest of the summer weeks the great blessing of public ice water fountains, will be enjoyed.
