Canadians Get "Medicine" Back

(Special to The Guardian.)

TORONTO, Nov. 15.—After a few days' visit to the U.S.A. two Canadians arrived home indignant at what they term over-officiousness on the part of the U.S.A. customs officers.

"When we were going over," said one Toronto man, "we took with us a couple of bottles of 'medicine,' stamped by the government. Some distance on this side of the border one of the U.S.A. officials made his appearance and shouted: 'Open your bags! Everyone in the car completed, including my friends. We never dreamed that he would confiscate our 'medicine,' but he did. My friend explained to him that we were just going over to visit a friend.

"I don't care what your mission is, you cannot bribe an American officer," said the official.

"We tried to explain that we had no such intention, but he brushed us aside and walked away with our supply.

"To say we were mad only expresses it mildly. We were thinking the matter over when a gentleman in the next seat said: 'Excuse me, but he had no right to take that. You are still on Canadian soil.

"Oh, that! There was quick movement to locate the zealous official and we did.

"You are the officer who examined our bags and confiscated our medicine?" I said.

"Yes I am," was the haughty reply.

"Well, you will please put it back. We are Canadians and on Canadian soil. You put our goods back."

"Who gave you that information?" he asked.

"That is not your business," I replied. "We have just wakened up to the fact that you had no authority to act while on Canadian soil."

"Needless to say when we reached the U.S. border there was nothing left for the official."

Babe Ruth Promises To Attend To Work

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Babe Ruth has turned over a new leaf. The big hitter of the Yankees appeared before Col. T. L. Huston in the club offices in West 42nd street this afternoon on his return from his barnstorming trip through the West and announced the following platform for the Winter campaign:

No vaudeville contracts.

No hunting trips.

No automobile tours.

No dallying with the bookmakers at the Winter tracks.

None of this wine, woman and song stuff.

Back to the farm is Ruth's motto. Tuesday he will start for the little home he owns at Sudbury and will begin to chop trees. He means to get down to real work and he means to keep at it all the winter.

"I wasn't satisfied with what I did last season," said the Babe. "I agree with Col. Huston that my value to the team lies in my ability to hit home runs and I am going to show that I can beat my 1921 record if I set a full season in which to do it.

"We had a good trip through the West. We ran into bad weather and we played a game in Kansas City in a driving rain, but generally it was pretty good. I made 20 home runs in 17 games and Bob Meusel made 17."

Ruth appeared interested when told that the new Yankee ball park, where he will have to hit 'em next spring, is far deeper in center field than the Polo Grounds.

Asked about the prospects of the Yankees for next season, he said that the American League champions "ought to report."

Says Stabilization Depends on Fixing German Payments

(Special to The Guardian.)

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—The German note to the Reparations Commission, made public here today, contends that final stabilization of the reparations question has been definitely settled in accordance with Germany's capacity to pay. Since Germany cannot await such a final settlement, she proposes a provisional one, but, even to achieve this, foreign assistance must be forthcoming. The Reichsbank is declared to be in readiness to place 500,000,000 gold marks at the disposal of the government for the purpose of stabilization.

The project, as set forth, depends upon the following conditions:

First, Germany must be freed for three or four years from all payments in cash or in kind under the Treaty of Versailles, although she will continue to make deliveries in kind for the devastated areas so far as these do not entail any increase in her floating debt.

Second, Germany considers she should receive a minimum of 500,000,000 gold marks from foreign banks.

The foregoing conditions of the Reichsbank are necessary prior to giving the gold from its reserve. The money to be advanced by the Reichsbank and by foreign banks will be administered by an independent board. When the progress of stabilization is sufficiently advanced the German government will issue an internal gold loan.

Half the proceeds of the internal loan and the full yield from the foreign loans will be utilized to cover the payments in cash and in kind due under the Versailles Treaty, and the other half of the proceeds of the internal loan will be applied to the requirements of Germany's own budget.

These measures, it is declared, will enable Germany to balance her budget, check the increase in her floating debt and discontinue discounting treasury bills with the Reichsbank.

Proposes Economics.

Germany, however, says that she will abolish all dispensable departments, reduce the number of officials, avoid unproductive expenditure, restrict legislation enjoining new expenditure and reorganize the government enterprises on a productive basis.

Germany will take all requisite measures to increase production, while retaining the eight-hour day as the normal working day, and will restrict the importation and consumption of luxuries and alcohol. In order to execute the foregoing plans, Germany proposes:

First, final settlement upon the amount of Germany's obligation at the earliest possible moment, so that these obligations, together with the liquidation of the

Moderator For National Church

WINNIPEG, Nov. 15.—"My hope for this country is a National Pro-Testant Church," Rev. Dr. W. Clark, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, declared in addressing a Presbyterian meeting here.

Dr. Clark went on to explain that he did not mean a state church, but one that gathered all the Pro-Testant forces together. There was nothing, after all, that divided the denominations on vital questions, he claimed. On the fundamentals they stood as one.

Fox Breeders' Meeting Held at Summerside

Last Saturday night a well attended and representative meeting of the fox breeders of the vicinity was held in the office of Mr. E.H. Rayner at Summerside, when the co-operative marketing of furs, classification of pelts and general marketing conditions were fully and ably discussed. Mr. W.H. Bennett, New York, representative of Messrs. Fred'k Huth & Co., of London, England, addressed the meeting at some length and outlined the various points in the discussion were Messrs. E.H. Rayner, Geo. Brown of Margate, E.H. Monkley, B.W. Robinson and John Mollison. Mr. Bennett showed very conclusively that the present system of cataloguing in vogue at the London Sales was confusing to the buyer and detrimental to the seller and good prices. He advocated co-operation between the breeder and the seller in the specific grading of furs so that the buyers could, without undue waste of their valuable time, overlook the class of skins they wished to purchase when on view before the sale, and the consecutive cataloguing of the skins by classification so that they would know exactly at what their selections. Mr. Bennett advocated the grouping of pelts into classes, namely: silver, 1/2 silver, 3/4 silver and pure silver, to eliminate from these classes all pelts under a certain value. This was put to vote and it was unanimously agreed that this classification should be adopted and that all skins valued at \$40 or under should be thrown out and classed as "Sundry Foxes," which would cover about 33 percent of all the skins shipped. It was further unanimously resolved that it should be left to the judgment of the broker to spread pelts over sales so as to avoid glutting the market. Mr. Bennett advised that skins should not be cleaned "before shipment or bear any indelible mark for identification.

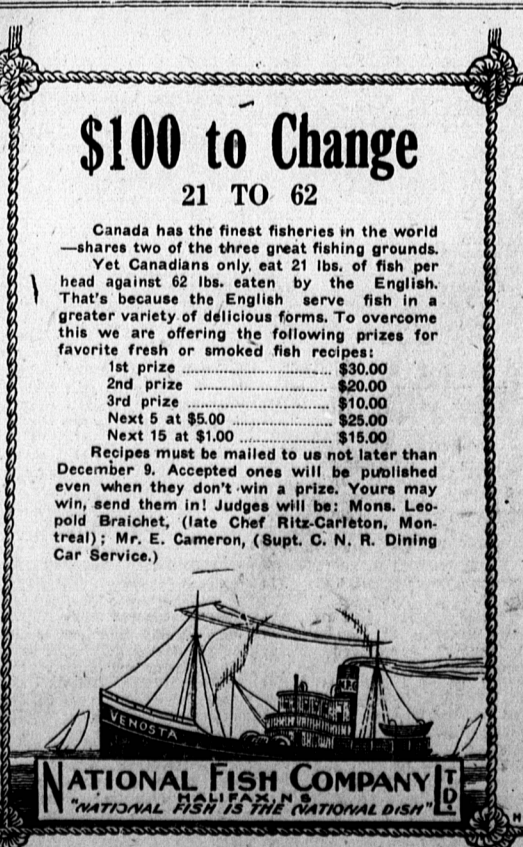
