

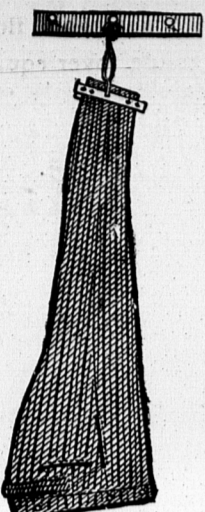


# Men's Trousers

### C. P. R. TO CLOSE SHOPS.

MONTREAL, Oct. 16—The Canadian Pacific has decided to close the repair and car building plant at Farnham, where for many years the shops have employed 500 men, the average pay-roll being about \$20,000 per month.

### MAIL CARRIER PAID A CENT PER YEAR

GALENA, Ill., Oct. 15.—Since 1881, a period of twenty-eight years, a man who has been carrying the mails over an eight mile route at an annual salary of one cent has lost his job. It was not from any neglect of duty that this employee of the Government was ruthlessly severed from the pay roll. Neither is there any evidence that there was unwilling to continue longer the duties of his position, for he worked as long as his penny a year was forthcoming.

The Post-Office Department has decided to discontinue star route No. 39125, between Dodgeville and Mineral Point. This line of eight miles was a remnant of the old route, established between Milwaukee and Galena, in 1835. It was reduced to eight miles in 1881.

The carrier has been offered as high as \$20 for his Government order paying him his yearly stipend, but has thus far resisted the souvenir hunters.

### GIVE UP CHASE OF BANK ROBBERS

OTTAWA, Oct. 16—The authorities are now convinced that the trio of safe blowers have escaped from the vicinity and active search has been called off. The men are thought to have boarded a freight train and are now probably miles away.

### CONGO OUTRAGES TO BE EXPOSED

NEW YORK, Oct. 14—A cable despatch to The American, from Brussels, says:

The atrocities perpetrated by King Leopold of Belgium through his representatives in the Congo Free State are to be exposed at last in a court of law.

The torturing and maiming of defenceless native men, women and children, which has excited the indignation, but never the active interference, of the civilized world, will be feared, and, it is hoped, proved by Lieutenant Emil Dörpelaus, a naval officer, who, in outer disgust, has given up his contract as an official in the Congo to come home and reveal to his country men the horrors that he has witnessed with his own eyes.

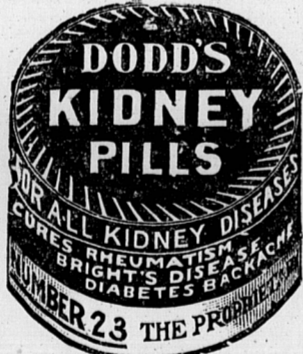
Lieutenant Dörpelaus has been for two years in the employ of the Société Anonyme Belge in the Congo. He managed to endure the sight of a native man flayed alive because he had failed to bring in the assigned tribute of rubber to the Belgian officials. But when the Lieutenant beheld a woman bound hand and foot upon a hill of red ants and devoured by the insects, he gave up his commission and returned to this country.

The company, alleging breach of contract, refused to pay his back salary or to reimburse him his expenses. The Lieutenant admits breaking his contract, but sets up the defence that the company breaks the law and by that acting validates the contract. He is now suing the company, and there is to be a court hearing at which the atrocities of the Congo will be brought home to King Leopold and laid bare as they have never been before.

### MINISTER WROTE FAKE REPORT

TORONTO, October 16—Because it published last winter a story of a ghost which was said to haunt a certain house on Pape Avenue and keep one of the doors of the house from closing, the Toronto World was today ordered by the court to pay Mark Maynard owner of the house, one hundred dollars damages and pay also the costs of the suit. It took the jury three hours to decide the case. Maynard claimed damages for flowers and shrubs trampled down by a crowd of curiosity seekers which the story prompted to visit the house, also for depreciation in the value of the property and for the illness of his wife, caused by excitement when the throngs gathered round the place.

The jury found for the plaintiff on the first count only. The writer of the story in question was a well-known Toronto clergyman, who frankly admits that the thing was pure fiction.

### TERRIBLE ACT OF INSANITY.

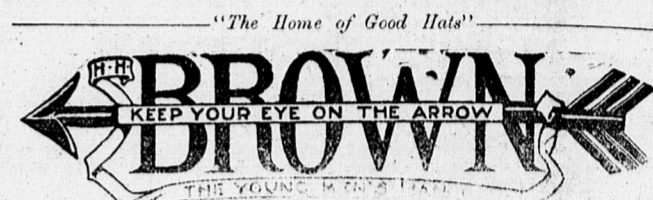

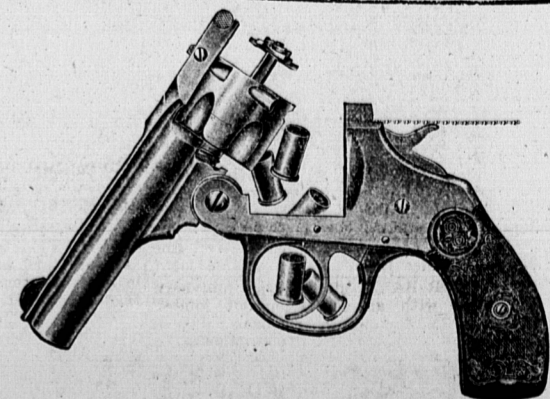
